

Timber Thieves

Timber thieves from Quebec have been cutting down trees in Ontario and towing or floating them across Lake Temiskaming, Crown Attorney Geo. Black said in court Friday.

The department of lands and forests had been aware of the thieves for some time — "but it has been very difficult to catch them."

He made the statements during the trial of Marcell Everhest of Fabre, Quebec, who pleaded guilty to the theft of 12 trees.

Everhest was caught by a lands and forests officer after an observer "saw trees floating across the lake."

Magistrate Gould told Everhest it was unusual for a fine to be imposed for theft — "but in this case it may serve the purpose" — and fined him \$25 with \$28.60 court costs.

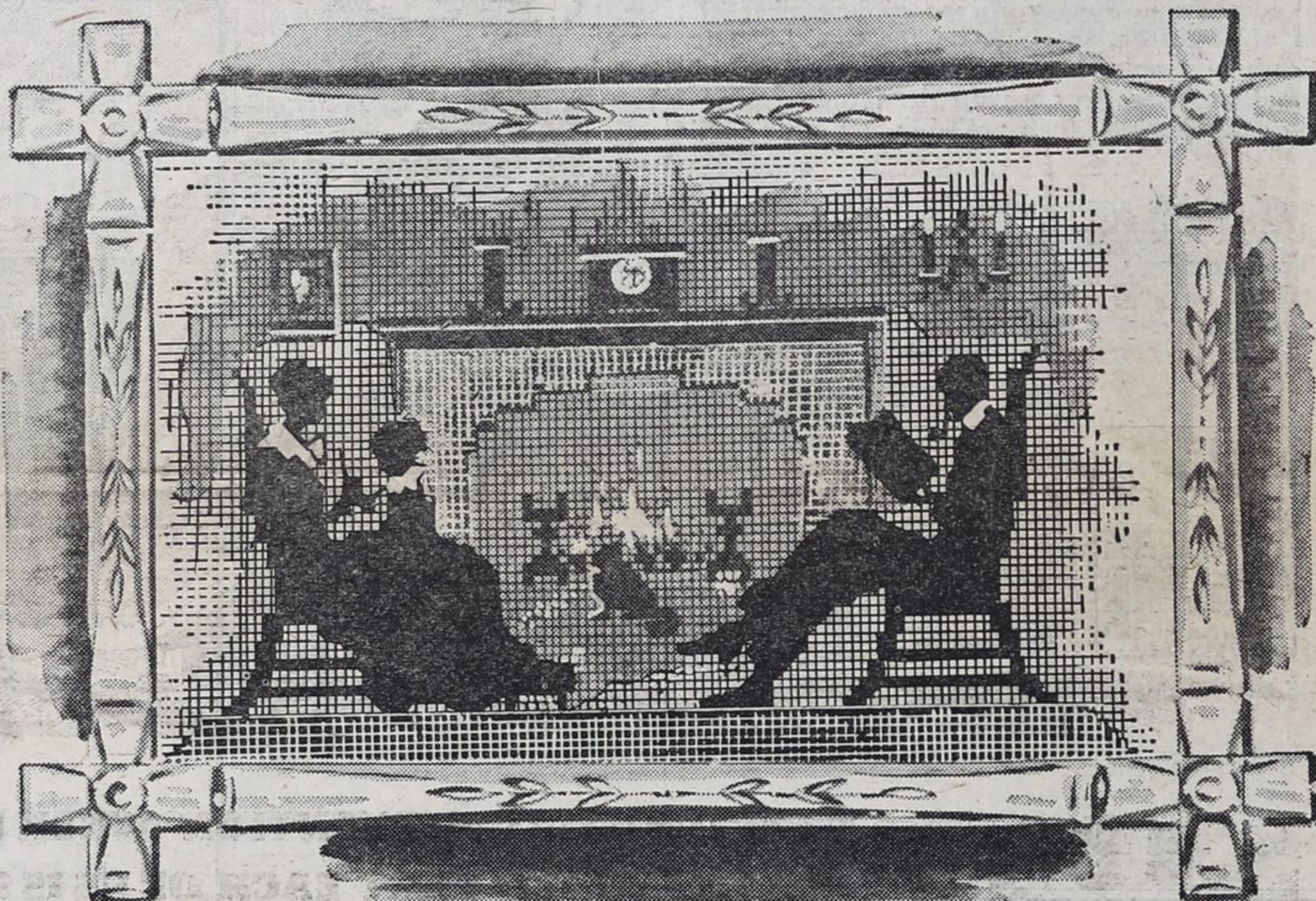
