

# Week-end Bear Hunt Nets Eight Prime Skins

The bear hunt is on, and Mayor Leo Del Villano of Timmins appears to be the only mayor who has been successful in getting sufficient hunters to make a try for the 300 skins needed for the

Queen's Guards. But his hunters haven't had much luck in locating the wily black bear, and only four bears were killed by the group of hunters he led into the bush on Saturday

and Sunday hunts. Four additional skins were received from other parts of the north.

Mayor Del Villano blamed the bad weather for the small bag, and said that the hunts will continue until June 15, when the bear licenses expire.

The mayor said he had received skins from Kirkland Lake, Kapuskasing, Carleton Place and has promises of others from North Bay, Liskeard and Cochrane.

While the Timmins party is having some difficulty in locating bear, a Cobalt prospector shot one

on Monday from his cottage door. Frank Mackay was enjoying his supper when a 300-pound black bear looked in his window.

He dropped the animal with a couple of shots, and said he would donate the skin to the bearskin committee if it is wanted. "If no one wants it, I will take it to the dump," he said, "bears are so plentiful here that we just throw them on the dump when we shoot them to get rid of the nuisance."

Down at North Bay Don Delaplante received a skin from Charlie Furnam who shot the ani-

mal using a .22 rifle. The bear was flushed by Furnam's dog, and he killed it with one shot through the heart.

The name of Niagara Falls comes from the Indian word "Onguia-ahra," which meant "thunderer of the waters."
