

Mission Society Holds Annual

The Presbyterian W.M.S. Annual Meeting was held at St. Andrew's Church, Kirkland Lake on Saturday, May 23. Mrs. James Stewart of Cochrane, Presbyterian President presided at the afternoon and evening sessions.

The meeting opened with a hymn, Scripture reading and prayer, after which Mrs. Haughton of Kirkland Lake extended a very warm welcome to the gathering which was responded to by Mrs. Ferguson of Cochrane.

Mrs. William Reeves of Kirkland Lake read the minutes of previous meetings and the various Presbyterian secretaries submitted their reports.

Roll call of auxiliaries was responded to by forty-two delegates including two ladies from the congregation at Val d'Or.

A beautiful solo was sung while the offering was being taken. Mrs. Litster of Englehart offering prayer.

The treasurer's report was heard and proved interesting and informative.

The guest speaker was introduced by Mrs. Stewart and Mrs. Fred Knox on furlough from the Bhil Field in India gave a most interesting address, on the work of the missionaries in India, showing samples of the clothing, jewellery. She told how badly doctors are needed — in Canada one doctor to every 300 people — in India one doctor to twenty-two thousand.

She showed us a book which she and her husband use to illustrate to the people. A black page for sin, a red page for the blood of Christ shed for us, a white page showing our sins made white as snow, a gold page for Heaven and a green page to show the growth of life through Christ. This was a real glimpse into the life and work of both peoples.

Report of the nominating committee was received and the 1959 officers were installed by Rev. Norman Young.

Mrs. Stanley Maddock extended an invitation to hold the 1960 meeting in New Liskeard.

Rev. Young pronounced the benediction, closing the sessions for another year.

New Hydro Dam At Lower Notch Being Explored

An Ontario Hydro geological team has started investigations at Lower Notch on the Montreal River to determine whether the site is capable of economic development for generating electricity.

An advance party is already in the site area, about 20 miles south-east of Cobalt, and a base camp is being set up at the nearby Matabitchuan Generating Station. The 15-member team will remain in the area during the summer. A preliminary survey of Lower Notch was completed last year.

Ontario Hydro engineers estimate the site has a potential capacity of 25,000 kilowatts. Extensive investigations must be completed, however, before the feasibility of constructing a generating station at Lower Notch can be determined.

The investigations are part of Ontario Hydro's long range program to develop the province's remaining water resources. Similar surveys and investigations are now going on at a number of sites in

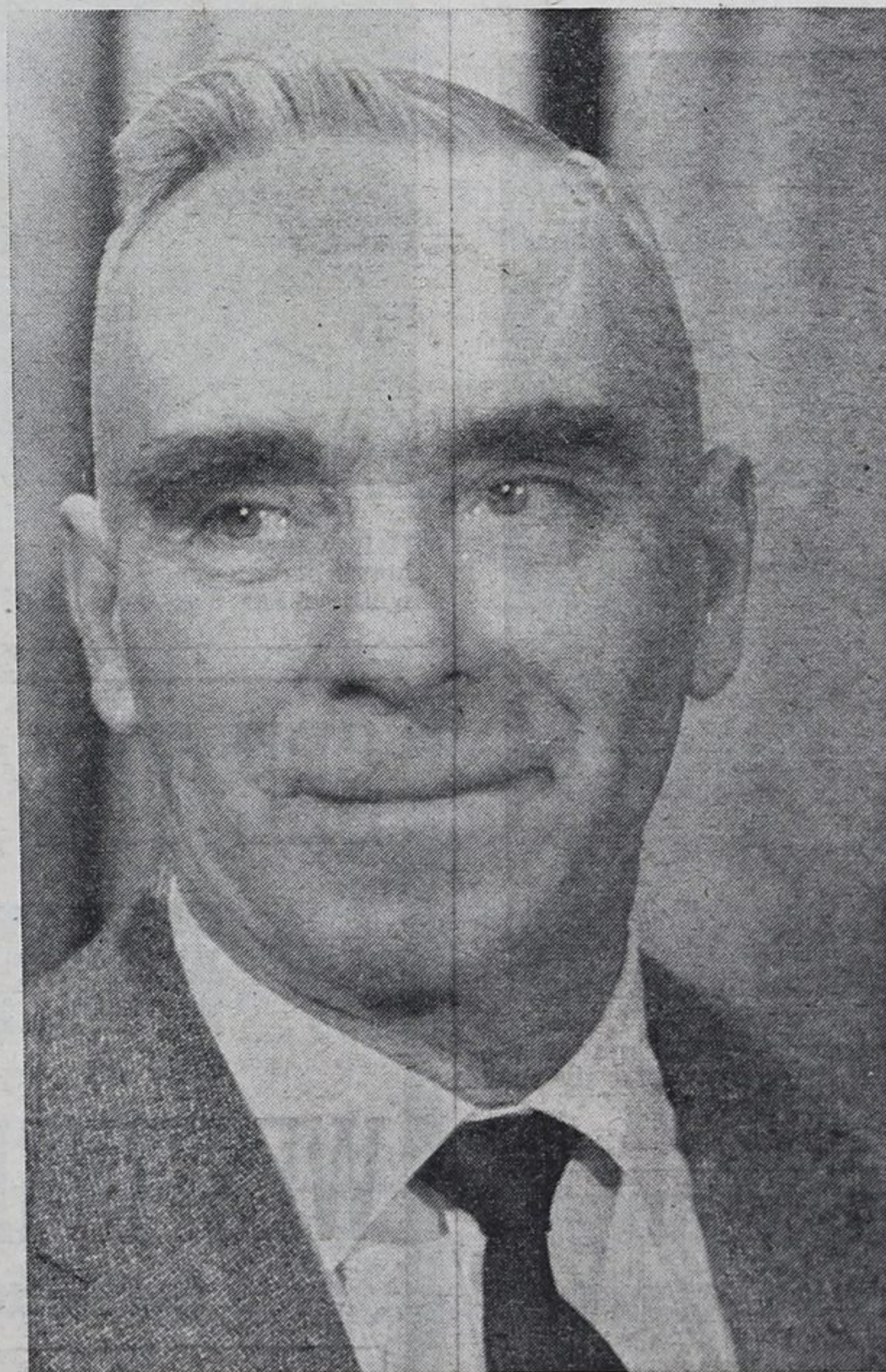
