Cobalt council three-man delegation which travelled to Toronto on town business is back, but the results of the visit are not released for publication.

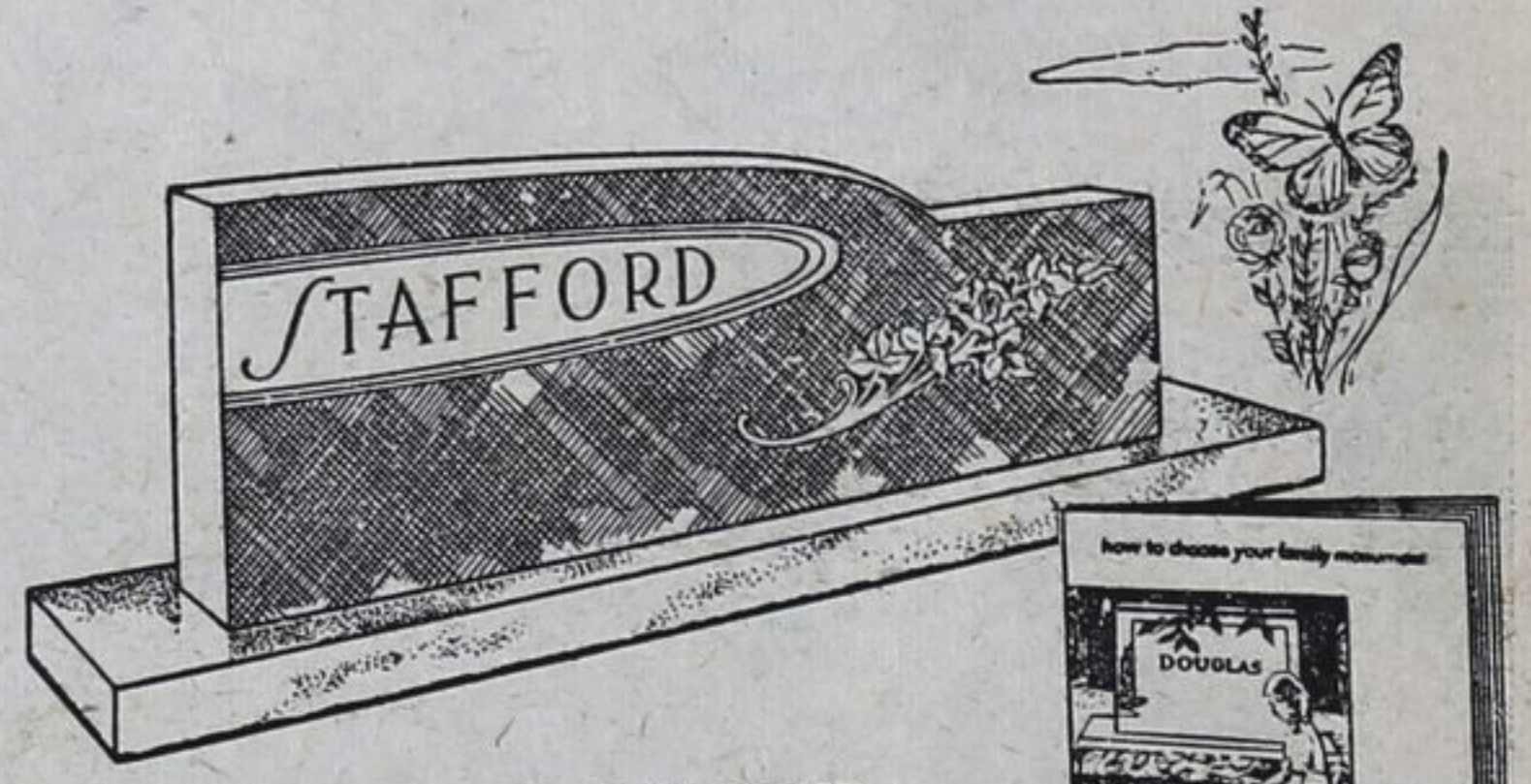
Mayor Fulton Purdy, town clerk Cyril Vezina and solicitor W. C. Inch, made the trip and met with government officials seeking a solution to the problem of properly assessing Mastermet Mines for a parcel of property at the north end of the town, without going to the expense of having it surveyed.

Cost of survey is estimated at \$4,000.

Mastermet president Hugh Sutherland recently received a judgement from the court of appeals which ruled that the town could not assess him on property for which no survey had been registered at the Land Titles office in Haileybury.

Mayor Purdy said that any nouncement at this time would be premature and would prejudice the town's case.

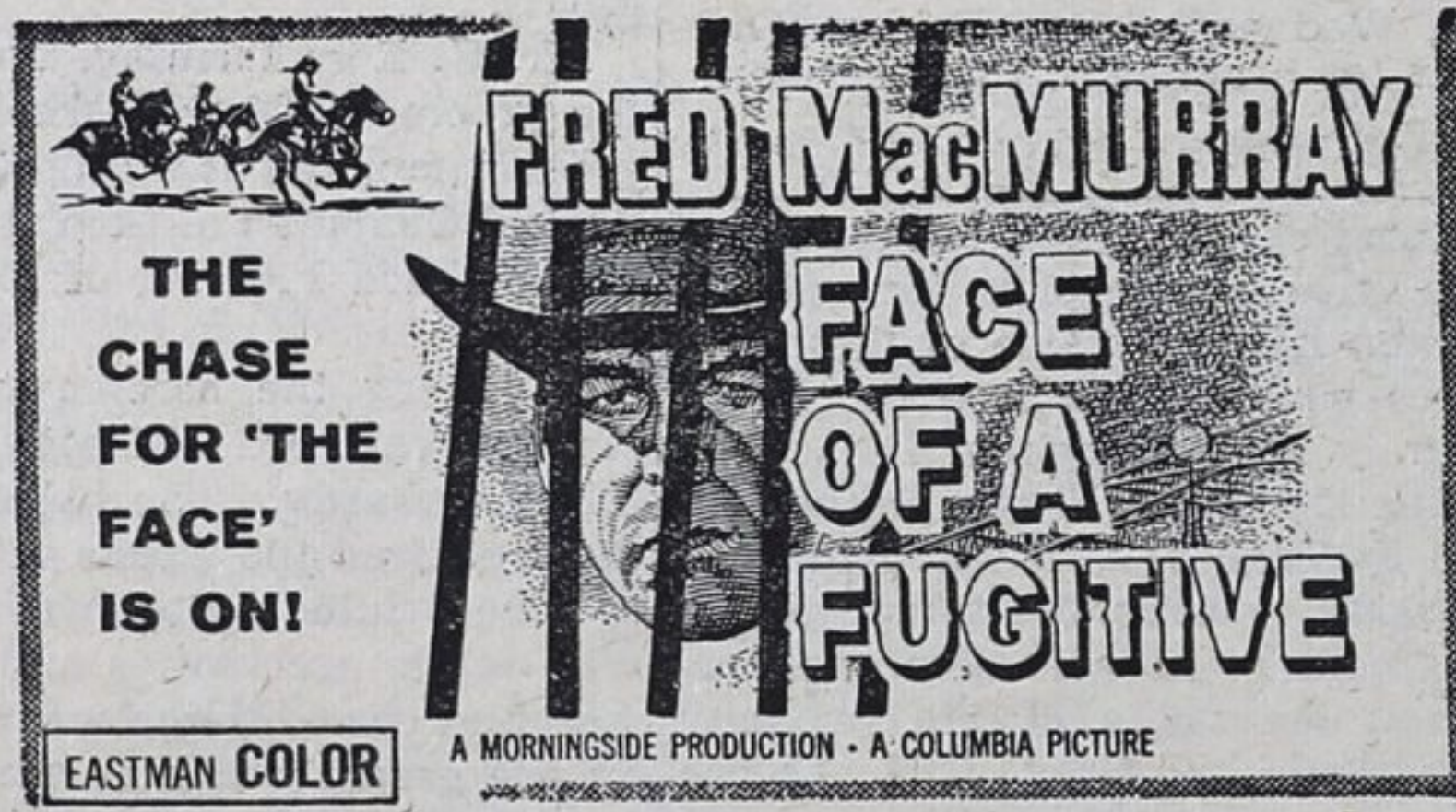
