LONDON — An ecclesiastical court has vetoed a plan to install an ultra-modern statue of Christ by sculptor Sir Jacob Epstein in a medieval abbey.

The law officer of the Anglican York diocese ruled in favor of 400 parishioners in the northern English town of Selby who opposed the proposal of their minister and church wardens to install the "heathen" six-ton marble statue in the local abbey.
