EDMONTON — The Edmonton parks department, with help from the weather, this year won its running battle with mosquitoes.

The department reported the summer season was one of the best on record.

Dr. Brian Hocking, head of the entomology department at the University of Alberta, said the victory over the pesky skeeter was due to efficient control measures and favourable weather conditions.

The battle started early in the spring when a ground force of 30 men sprayed chemicals on stagnant water which appeared to be mosquito breeding grounds.

Two aircraft were also used, attacking the areas inaccessible from the ground.

Anti-mosquito weather conditions prevailed throughout the crucial breeding periods to help the cause.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich. — Managing editor Eugene (Shine) Sundstrom set off more excitement than anything lately in this city at the eastern tip of upper Michigan.

He chased a moose out of his front yard and through town.

"I was asleep upstairs," the managing editor of the Sault Ste. Marie Evening News reported. "My wife, Doris, yelled: 'Shine! There's a big bull moose in the yard! I popped my head out the

window, and sure enough, there he was, bigger than a good-sized work horse.

"When I got downstairs, I looked out. He had vanished. I called the cops, but was cagey. I just asked had they heard anything about a moose on the loose.

"They had. Said Bob Gilray had met one head-on on a bridge and had called up, pretty excited.

"Doris and I ran to the car. About a block away, there he was under a street light. We moved in behind him and Gilray moved in behind us, and Mr. Big started trotting off the pavement across the court house lawn, then he trotted through a gas station.

"Over by the country club he took to the woods. That's the last anybody saws of him."

FORT BRAGG, N.C. — Military authorities have confirmed a report that an officer and 32 enlisted men spent more than an hour searching for a general's cane that had dropped from a helicopter.

They said the cane, belonging to Brig. - Gen. William Harris, 18th airborne corps commander, was "a valuable memento which had become a sort of unofficial unit symbol."

The cane slipped from Harris' grasp while he was viewin a troop exercise.

The cane was found. An army statement quoted Gen. Harris as saying he didn't order the search or know about it.

WINNIPEG — A man whose 1956 income tax return contained no figures — just comments — is winning his legal battle against what he calls "the petty, uncontrolled bureaucrat."

Gerald Hart, 44-year-old operator of Hart Electronics Limited here, was taken to court by the income tax department on the grounds that he did not file a 1956 return for his business.

However, a magistrate ruled that he had filed a return, even though it contained no figures. The Manitoba Court of Appeal concurred in the decision.

Federal authorities now are reported considering what to do next.

Some lawyers say the appeal court decision cannot be appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada since it was a stated case in which the magistrate asked the appeal court for an opinion on his ruling.

Some of the questions and answers on Mr. Hart's return:

Financial statements and schedules: "None available."

Taxable income: "Not known, cannot afford expensive accounting."

Reserves as provisions for doubtful debts or liabilities: "No reserves, all debts doubtful, liability unlimited."

Any loans made available to shareholders: "What with?"

"In reference to your letter of July 17, reference C. Murray, I beg to differ with you in connec-

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tion with the statement in your first paragraph as a T2 return was filed for 1956, whether you and your bloodhounds wish to admit it or not."

At one point, Mr. Hart sent the income tax department a bill for \$30 to cover the time spent making returns.
