

(Continued From Page One) The jury attached a recommendation to their verdict as follows: whereas school children may get a false feeling of security from legislation which makes cars stop behind the bus, we suggest that children should be instructed not to leave the side of the road until the bus has moved on and the road is clear in both directions. These instructions should be given at school, with signs in the bus and by the bus driver.

The Department of Motion Picture Censorship pays close attention to all advertising associated with film entertainment. It is the only province in English speaking Canada which scrutinizes every piece of advertising. During the year terminating March 1959, it reviewed 28,216 specimens of advertising rejecting 528 and insisting on the treatment of 82 pieces.

It recognizes that views and reading matter in advertising remain fixed before the reader, while Coroner A. C.
