Mrs. Alice Richards Dies in Car Crash

Funeral services were held in New Liskeard on Tuesday for Mrs. Alice Richards who died in a Highway accident near Bourkes last Sunday morning.

A former resident of New Liskeard, Mrs. Richards, with her husband and four other persons was on her way to visit relatives in Timmins. She has been living in Hamilton since 1951.

Mrs. Richards died of injuries received when she was thrown from the car when it went out of control and rolled over.

Born in Cayuga, Ontario, on July 5, 1888, she came north with her parents in 1904 where they settled on a farm near Thornloe.

Marrying Herbert Richards in 1906 the couple settled in New Liskeard for a few years, after which they went to Saskatchewan where they farmed until returning to Thornloe in 1930. After moving to New Liskeard in 1941 the couple retired in Hamilton in 1951.

During these years Mrs. Richards won the respect and admiration of her neighbours and friends. She was an active member of the First Baptist Church, New Liskeard.

Mrs. Richards was pre-deceased by one son, Aubrey, who died in 1922 at the age of 12 years and survived by three brothers—Ernie, Fort Macleod, Alberta; Wesley, South Porcupine; Reginald, St. Catharines; and two sisters: Carol McGill, Haileybury; and Jessie Huddle, Branchton, Ontario. Also, by five sons and four daughters: Ivan, Blind River; Harold, Baldonal, B.C.; Wesley, New Liskeard; Lewin, Sarnia; Vida Nightingale, Hamilton; Gladys Briggs, Toronto; Allan, Jarvie, Alberta; and Marjorie Hare, Timmins.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. England from Perrin Funeral Home, New Liskeard, at 2:30 on October 13.
