

Haileybury Wins Shuts Out Liskeard

First Quarter:

Buffam of Haileybury kicks off to New Liskeard, Christianson receiving and running back to about his own 40. After many series of end runs New Liskeard worked their way up to Haileybury's 25 yard line. They could not get that first down again so kicked into Haileybury's end zone, Buffam running back to his own three. Haileybury then started its march got as far as the New Lis- 35 yard line. Stothart quar- backing the New Liskeard squad, passed but was intercepted by Black of Haileybury, who ran back to New Liskeard's 30. This quarter was fought in this fashion throughout. A battle with New Liskeard having many opportunities to hit Haileybury's end zone, but would get as far as Haileybury's 25 yard line then their attack would fizzle. This quarter also showed a completely disorganized Haileybury squad. No offensive attack could actually mount, but showed a determined effort in some individual players. Second Quarter:

This second quarter was completely repetitious of the first. There was no exceptional or spectacular plays by either squad. Begg took over the quarterback's job for New Liskeard and mounted an aerial attack. Begg passing on his own 35 yard line was intercepted by Fleming of Haileybury on 50 yard line. From New Liskeard's 50, Tyson quarterbacked the squad to New Liskeard's 30, but got no further. Doran kicks into New Liskeard's end zone, the run back got New Liskeard to own 25. New Liskeard could not get ten yards, kicked to own 30, no run back. Haileybury tried for first downs, but could not get by New Liskeard's defensive unit. The rest of the quarter was played in similar fashion, with neither team threatening to get that precious point or touchdown. Dave Black played a very strong game both defensively and offensively with a few more individuals in this half. This half did not show the Haileybury squad of old, and it certainly did not show the team working as a unit. On the New Liskeard side the situation was a little better, but they seemed to fizzle when deep in Haileybury's territory.

Half Time: Haileybury 0, New Liskeard 0.

Third Quarter:

This second half showed that Haileybury certainly is a second half team. They started to show that fighting spirit of old. To start the quarter Stothart of New Liskeard kicked off with Fleming of Haileybury receiving, stopped on own 50 yard line. Tyson quarterbacked the squad to New Liskeard 20, then on the next play Buffam made a beautiful run on the off tackle play to hit pay dirt. Accompanied with this play was beautiful faking by George Mahon on a fake end run which completely fooled the whole New Liskeard team. The convert attempt was missed. The rest of the quarter was a furious battle with New Liskeard trying to tie the game up and Haileybury protecting their six point lead. In this quarter it

certainly was more enjoyable from a spectator's point of view, with many spectacular plays from both sides and with some New Liskeard threats, but the attacks were thwarted by Haileybury's rejuvenated defensive wall.

Third Quarter: Haileybury 6, New Liskeard 0.

Fourth Quarter:

This quarter was completely dominated by Haileybury, New Liskeard did not seem to be in the game any longer. New Liskeard started the quarter with the ball in their possession, but could not gain their first downs. Haileybury similarly could not gain. This pattern was evident until half way through the quarter, when Haileybury landed the bomb on New Liskeard. Haileybury with the ball on own 30 tried the off middle play, with no fake, Buffam ran the distance, a spectacular run, out-running the whole New Liskeard squad to get his second touchdown of the afternoon. The convert by Tyson was good. Gord Scalzo, who played a bang up game, handled the kicking chore this time and hoisted a beautiful one that travelled to New Liskeard's end zone. The run back was to New Liskeard's three. Next play New Liskeard quarterback was tackled behind the goal line for a safety touch. New Liskeard took over on own 25 yard line and marched down the field on a series of end runs, to get a touchdown, but the points were nullified because of the penalty of blocking over ten yards. This attempt ended the quarter and the game.

This now leaves Haileybury in undisputed possession of first place with two wins, one tie and no losses.

Albert Miller

Bert Miller, highly respected and pioneer resident of Cobalt passed away quietly in his sleep at Humber Memorial Hospital, Toronto, on Thursday, October 1st, 1959.

Born in Waltham Mass. U.S.A., son of Frederic and Lydia Miller, Mr. Miller was in his 79th year. For the past five he has been a resident of Toronto, late of 580 Tretheway Drive. He married Anna Theresa Lafrange at Cobalt in April 1918.

The late Mr. Miller received his education in Boston and New York and as a young man worked as stenographer at the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb in New York city. Hearing of the mining boom in Northern Ontario, Mr. Miller set out for the young rugged mining camp of Cobalt, arriving in February 1908. It was not long before he acquainted himself with prospectors in the silver camp and with H. E. "Tim" Cawley of Haileybury, found himself prospecting throughout the South Porcupine area. During the big fire there in 1911 it was only by the narrowest escape that they were able to get out of the flaming bush.

Returning to Cobalt and to the type of work for which he was trained, Mr. Miller worked for Judge Mahon and Judge Ross and later became assistant town clerk in Cobalt. He joined the Northern Ontario Power Company in November 1923, working in their Cobalt office and later became Inventory Inspector visiting all offices throughout the north. When this company was taken over by the Hydro Electric Power Commission of Ontario, Mr. Miller was transferred and worked in their New Liskeard Area office until his retirement on February 1, 1950.

During his early years, Mr. Miller took a keen interest in sports. Bowling was among his favorites and on several occasions he was a member of provincial teams competing in Canada and U.S.A. Numerous bowling trophies attrib-

ute to his skill in this game. The now seldom heard of roller skate hockey was another sport in which he excelled.

After his retirement, Mr. Miller devoted a great deal of his spare time to his interests around Cobalt. These included membership on the Public School Board for several years with one term as chairman, gardening, assessor for Coleman Township, and assisting R. L. O'Gorman with municipal audit work at Haileybury and Matachewan. Mr. Miller was a life member of the Masonic Lodge.

He leaves to mourn his passing his wife Anna of Toronto, one son Arnold and two grandchildren of Newmarket, one sister Elsie (Mrs. Tolas) of Beverly Mass., Fred of Danvers Mass., and Robert of California. Three brothers, Herman, Charles and Henry predeceased him.

Mr. Miller rested at the funeral chapel of A. Roy Miller, Toronto on Friday, October 2nd from 7:30 to 9:30 and was then brought to Cobalt. Masonic service was held in the Buffam Funeral Chapel prior to the burial service from the Cobalt United Church. Interment was in Mount Pleasant Cemetery, Haileybury.

Blinded By Lights Driver Hits Pole

A Saturday evening accident on Highway 11 half-way between Haileybury and New Liskeard, was the only one of five minor weekend accidents resulting in injury.

Aurele Deraiche, 21, Haileybury and two of his five passengers sustained minor injuries when the car in which they were driving lost control and struck a telephone pole. The vehicle has been written off as a total wreck.

Deraiche said he was blinded by the lights of an oncoming vehicle before hitting the shoulder and losing control.

He suffered minor lacerations. Laurette Trauseau, 18, suffered a bruised right knee and lacerations to the left leg. Henry Godreault, 26, got a cut forehead. Both passengers are from Haileybury.

There were four other minor accidents in the Haileybury OPP detachment area for the week-end but no injuries. Const. G. Forde investigated the Sunnyside crash.
