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Haileybury Man Fatally Hurt in Mine

COBALT — Rene Sauve of Haileybury was killed Tuesday in the Christopher mine of the Agnico Mining Company. The 38-year-old miner leaves his wife and six children.



According to mine manager Tim Cawley, Sauve had been working on the 600 level of the Christopher when he was sent to work on the 500.

Sauve made his way to the lower level using a ladder in a manway.

Apparently Sauve reached the bottom of the manway, then tried to hitch a ride on an approaching electric locomotive which was hauling six one-ton ore trucks.

The driver of the train, Lucien Plaunt, was standing on one side of the small platform at the front

of the locomotive. Mr. Cawley said that it appears that Sauve forgot that there is a protruding ore chute just past the recessed manway.

He jumped on to the locomotive but was smashed into the side of the ore chute. Sauve suffered massive internal injuries and died within an hour.

He is survived by his wife and six children. They are Darlene, 16; Norman, 14; Freddy, 12; Linda, eight; Wendy, five; and Kim, one year.

Also surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Sauve of Haileybury; eight brothers and five sisters. Surviving brothers are Rheel, Ernie, Lawrence, Fernand, all of Haileybury; Gerry, Cobalt; Marcel, Rouyn; Romeo, New Liskeard; and Lionel, of Verner.

Mileage 104 Corner To be Fixed at Last

The department of highways is going to do something about the Mileage 104 corner just north of Cobalt. And the highway from New Liskeard to Earlton is going to be repaved.

These were just two local highlights in the 1960-61 estimates which were tabled recently by the minister of highways in the Ontario legislature.

The Mileage 104 curve was earmarked for "first stage revision." This covers draining and grading, but not paving.

Other new work highlights:

Base and paving — Highway 11, Earlton to Englehart, nine miles; Highway 66, from 8.5 miles east of Kirkland Lake to near Larder Lake.

ONR overhead at Earlton, including approaches.

Grading and drainage — Highway 65, 21 miles west of Elk Lake, to complete 1959 project; Highway 66, raising existing bridge and approaches; Highway 560, 26 to 28 miles west of Elk Lake, and 3.5 miles of rock cut widening west of Elk Lake; Highway 573, revision 6.5 miles south of Highway 112.

New culverts on Highway 560 at Breeze Creek and Highway 558 from six to eight miles west of Haileybury.

Highway 11, New Liskeard northerly to Earlton, including work through Earlton and on Highway 571, base and paving.

Highway 66, paving 8.6 miles east of Kirkland Lake.
