## Trapped By Road Block Speeders Are Nabbed In Earleton Stockyard

A wild 100-mile-per-hour chase up the North Road ended in Earleton when a stolen car crashed into a pile of railway ties in Earleton Stockyard early last Saturday morning. Three North Bay youths were taken into custody and are lodged in Haileybury jail.

Robert Whiteduck, John Ranger and Bernard MacDonald face charges of car theft, of breaking, entering and theft.

Constables Dave Paul and Bill Tinney were on patrol through New Liskeard when they saw the three youths getting into the late model car and approached to investigate.

The young men took off at high speed through New Liskeard and a chase followed at speeds that reached and exceeded 100 m.p.h., according to police.

The driver of the stolen car tried to ditch the police car by swinging back and forth across the road as the police attempted to bring it to a stop.

A road block was set up at the Englehart bridge by Constable Jim Burns of the Englehart division of the OPP and a similar one was arranged by the Kirkland Lake detachment.

But the young driver anticipated such a manoeuvre and turned off the highway as the car entered Earleton and entered the stock yards near the ONR lines.

## Break-in

**HAILEYBURY — Provincial Police here are investigating a break-in at the plant of Morissette Diamond Drilling. A burglar alarm called police to the plant early Thursday morning, but the thieves escaped.**

They used equipment stolen out of the machine shop to drill into the company's vault, but were foiled by the arrival of police. OPP Constable G. Ford and Sgt. J. Tappenden are investigating.

## Haileybury Juniors At North Tourney

Murray Black and John Horncastle, two of the junior players from the Haileybury Golf Club, were in Sudbury last week to play in the Northern Ontario Golf Association Tournament.

Murray placed second in the "B" Group, 15 years and under with a score of 338, just one point behind the winner, Ziggy Nowakel-vitch of Timmins who turned in a score of 337. John played several rounds but did not complete the course.

The winner of the senior "A" Group was Sandy McAndrew of the Sudbury-Copper Cliff Club. Runner-up was Bruno Guarda of Timmins. A number of Kirkland Lake Juniors played in Class "C", 13 years and under, and one in Class "B".

There were 51 entries in the tournament, 20 of them in Murray's class, 15 years and under.

The local boys were driven to Sudbury by Mr. Horncastle and returned with Charles Camsell who attended the tournament following a business trip to North Bay.

## Suspend Tax Collector

Cobalt's tax collector was suspended by the Town Council at a special Council meeting Monday afternoon. An audit of the tax records is now being conducted by Kemp and Kemp of New Liskeard.

At the regular meeting Tuesday evening, Mayor Fulton Purdy stated that the Council's action was taken after Town Clerk Cyril Vezina had brought certain matters to the attention of the Council.

"A thorough audit is being held, and it would be improper for the Council to make any further statements or comment in any way until this is completed," the Mayor said.

"However, the Council is appreciative of the vigilance exercised by Mr. Vezina," he said.

The car finally hit a pile of railway ties and skidded into a hydro pole. The young people were unhurt and were arrested as they piled out of the slightly damaged car.

In the car trunk were cigarettes, chocolate bars, money, pop and an electric power drill. These articles were stolen earlier from a Latchford Garage. The car was reported stolen in North Bay.

The arrested men will appear in the magistrate's court in Haileybury on Friday.

## Candore Explorations Has Encouraging Finds

Evidence that the New Liskeard area may one day become another Cobalt as far as mining is concerned, continues to pile up as more companies explore the ground surrounding the already rich Langis mine on the road to Judge.

Latest news is from Candore Explorations which is developing the Dolphin-Miller property, originally prospected by Harry Miller of Cobalt.

While underground work is deemed warranted, Candore Explorations wants to continue surface drilling for another month or so before deciding whether to unwater existing workings at its Dolphin-Miller silver property or drive over from the adjoining Langis mine, P. J. Sullivan, president,

told the annual meeting.

Seven surface holes have now been put down, three of which have given encouraging values and have established 80 ft. of continuity to a vein that is still open at both ends. This could be reached by driving 170 ft. from the present Dolphin shaft on the 360-ft. horizon, J. E. Jerome, consulting engineer, reports.

M. Kirsh was elected to the board of directors, replacing G. E. Buchanan.

Candore Explorations has sold the royalty rights on its original Red Lake area gold property to New Dickenson Mines for \$75,000, P. J. Sullivan, president, reveals in the annual report. Additional re-
