Some years the water in the river was so low that the boats couldn't get past a sandbar about a mile below Tomstown, so Captain Hendry or Captain Brickenden would load the mail and the most important freight into the large rowboat that was always tied behind the steamer, and row the rest of the way. Like the Mounties, they always did what they set out to do. And the meals they served on that boat for twenty-five cents were better and more abundant than you can get most places now by paying a dollar and a half.

Several warm humid days this past week provoked a bit of grumbling but the records kept by Mr. Reavell show that it was not nearly so warm as last year and very much below the maximum during the past 66 years.

The average daily mean temperature for July, this year, was 63.9, last year it was 72.3 and since 1894 it was 67.4.

The maximum temperature for the month this year was 85, on the tenth; last year it was 92 on the thirtieth, and in 1921 the thermometer reached a sizzling 102 degrees.

The minimum this year was 45 on July 1st, last year it was 50 on the twenty-fifth, and in 1924 it dropped to 35.8.

The warmest July on record was that of 1921 when the average temperature was 74.3 and the coolest was in 1895 when the average temperature recorded was 62.6.
