Open Season For Game Birds

The open season to hunt ruffed grouse, sharptailed grouse and spruce partridge in this area, and all of Ontario north of Highway 17 between Mattawa and Sault Ste Marie is September 15th to November 25th inclusive. No person shall hunt, kill or destroy in one day an aggregate number of ruffed grouse, sharp-tailed grouse or spruce partridge exceeding five. No person shall have in his possession, at one time, an aggregate number exceeding twenty. Of course, a Hunting Licence is required and Resident Hunting Licences are available and become valid September 1st, 1960.

The open season for ducks, geese, rails, coots, gallinules, woodcock and wilson snipe also starts September 15th, and remain open until December 15th in the Northern District.

Bag Limits

- Ducks—daily 6, possession limit 12.
- Geese—daily 5, possession limit 10.
- Coots, rails and gallinules — daily 6, possession limit 12.
- Wilson snipe—daily 8, possession limit 16.
- Woodcock — daily 8, possession limit 16.

As I see it . . .

Your Liberal Candidate for Temiskaming

The Sorry Record

During the past ten years, with a Conservative member in the Legislature, it is an unpleasant fact, but the riding has not fared well.

There are fewer farmers in Temiskaming today than there were ten years ago.

I would like to ask the following questions:

What has the Conservative Government done in the past 10 years to help the farmers of Temiskaming?

How much development has the O.N.R., built by the government as a development road, brought about in Temiskaming in the past ten years.

How much secondary industry has come to Temiskaming as a result of the government's Department of Planning and Development?

Why has the Conservative government's Department of Lands and Forests not developed a park on Lake Temiskaming?

How effective has the Conservative government's grants for education been when your school taxes have more than doubled in the past ten years?

Development

Temiskaming has not grown in the past 10 years during the period when a Conservative member represented this riding.

The opportunities for growth are here.

The Liberal Party's plan for the development of northern Ontario is based on the growth and development of the resources and skills which we possess.

For instance, there are 100,000 people in Temiskaming and Cochrane area to provide us with a market for our farm products. What is needed is a little leadership in developing this market for our farmers.

Why should the people of Temiskaming import 900 carloads of potatoes a year when some of the best potatoes in the world are grown near Englehart, Charlton and Elk Lake? What we need, and what I intend to work for, is provision of storage facilities for our Temiskaming potatoes so that we can eat and enjoy them all year instead of spending so much money having New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island potatoes shipped in.

And why can't we grow and market our own livestock? If we in Temiskaming ate meat raised here we could stop importing 20 carloads of meat a week at a tremendous saving in freight costs.

What we need, and what I intend to work for, is the establishment of an abattoir in Temiskaming so that our own farmers can raise and market enough beef and hogs to feed our own population.

I am a farmer and I realize it is not possible to do this overnight. But a start has to be made or improvement will never come.

Once we start building up our herds we will require more grain.

I believe we can grow this grain in Temiskaming and save ourselves the expense of importing grain from western Canada. Today, it costs Temiskaming farmers \$10 per ton more for grain than it does farmers in Southern Ontario.

I believe that we in Temiskaming should take advantage of the new chemical fertilizers to improve production. It costs Temiskaming farmers almost \$20 per ton more for fertilizer than farmers in southern Ontario. I will work to have a fertilizer plant established in Temiskaming.

Freight rates make living in Temiskaming expensive. Why should the people of Temiskaming pay a premium to live here? The Ontario Northland Railway should reduce freight costs and once again serve the purposes of development of northern Ontario. The railway was originally built to assist development. Why should it stop the job?

All these things I have suggested — storage facilities for our crops to help year-round marketing; an abattoir; a fertilizer

plant; lower freight rates — would stimulate the growth of Temiskaming and provide as many as 3,000 to 4,000 new jobs. This would be the first step towards progressive, permanent and worthwhile growth for Temiskaming.

The Conservative government has been in power in Ontario for 17 years and has not helped the expansion of Temiskaming. It is time to elect a vigorous, energetic representative of Temiskaming who is prepared to work and to fight for the Liberal program of positive development. Elect Harvey Plaunt September 29.

I will also work to have appointed a bilingual assistant to the manager of the Demonstration Farm.

Roads

All of us in Temiskaming know we need more roads and better roads.

Why has the Conservative government done so little in improving and extending the road system in Temiskaming during the nine years when this riding was represented by a government member?

Nine years ago the Judge Bridge on the White River collapsed and almost two years ago the Bailey bridge that replaced it wore out. Temiskaming drivers still must detour six miles to go to Notre Dame du Nord, Que.

I wonder how much money the Conservative government has wasted repairing a bad detour? How much business has Temiskaming lost because 15,000 potential customers in Quebec have become too disgusted to travel on that detour? How much money has Conservative neglect cost the drivers of Temiskaming in repair bills in the past nine years? Is that why our auto insurance rates are almost \$100 more than they are in southern Ontario?

And what about the Tri-town by-pass? I wonder how much money the Conservative government has wasted on surveys of the by-pass route that is now expected to be replaced?

I support the Liberal Party's plan to build roads now with which to develop Temiskaming and the whole of Northern Ontario. As your member in Queen's Park I will press the government for immediate completion of the White River bridge.

School taxes on your homes have more than doubled.

How effective is the Conservative government's program of education grants? Why does the government, which makes physical education a compulsory subject, not pay any grants on gymnasiums?

The Liberal Party believes that education is a personal service that is not related to property ownership and that education taxes should be raised from all government sources of revenue and not from property owners.

A vote for me, Harvey Plaunt, is a vote to cut your property taxes in half by having the cost of education taken off property owners.

Tourist Promotion

What effort has the Conservative government made to attract more tourists to Temiskaming?

I believe that Temiskaming offers tourists one of the finest recreation areas in Ontario and that the government could do a great deal to assist us to benefit from this very profitable holiday business.

I also feel that the government could greatly enlarge tourist business in the south end of Temiskaming by building a six-mile road into Anima Nipissing Lake south of Latchford.

And I feel that government could develop provincial park facilities in the Elk Lake - Gowganda area which is visited by many Canadian and American tourists each year.

I think that Ontario's hypocritical liquor laws discourage tourists and will press for reasonable and sensible liquor reform.

Tourists want reasonable accommodation. I support the Liberal Party's policy of establishing a government branch of small business promotion that could offer loans to tourist resort operators to expand their facilities and attract more business to Temiskaming.

Liberal Leader

In the two years John Wintermeyer has been leader of the Liberal Party in Ontario he has visited Temiskaming riding more often than the leaders of the Conservative and CCF parties combined. He has visited in the towns and on the farms. He has met and talked with hundreds of Temiskaming residents. He has visited our fairs and our livestock auctions.
