## Cobalt Delegate at NORA Conference

COBALT—The Cobalt-Coleman Recreation Committee met in the Township of Coleman office on Thursday, September 22. Members present were John Larabee, Joseph Robitaille, Lawrence Othmer, Albert Chitroni, Jack Church, Lloyd Humphreys, Reeve W. Martin and Secretary-Treasurer Miss I. Conti. Father M. Jeffery and F. MacKinnon were unable to attend.

The financial report to the Cobalt Public Library was read and discussed.

Two letters were read, one from the Cobalt-Coleman Minor Fastball Association and one from the Sr. Cobalt Silver Hawks asking for assistance. One delegate will be chosen to represent Cobalt-Coleman at the meeting in Cochrane of the Northern Ontario Recreation Conference on October 14, 15 and 16.

Five subjects are on the agenda for discussion at the meeting and are as follows: Volunteers in Part Time Leaders; Physical Fitness; Legislation for Licensing and Inspection of Arena Buildings; Outdoor Rinks, and discussions on N.O.P.H.A. and N.O.Q.B.A. Recreation Committee meetings will be held every second Thursday of each month.

## Football Roundup

If anybody thinks a Big Four football team can be run on a shoestring, the following figures should dispell the illusion:

It costs approximately \$250.00 to outfit each man for a Big Four game and each player requires practice gear, shoes, pants, sweaters, etc., which will run the bill up around the \$300.00 mark.

It costs more to equip linemen than halfbacks or ends. Most Big Four linemen wear ankle-high boots, costing around \$28.75 a pair. Backs and ends like low-cut shoes because they are lighter and these cost \$25.00 a pair.

Parkas or capes, which can run to \$60.00 are the most expensive single items in a player's wardrobe. Shoulder pads average \$38.00; pants, \$32.00; helmets, \$25.00; thigh pads, \$4.00; hip pads, \$7.00.

Miscellaneous equipment as game stockings, \$5.75, white socks, \$1.00; supporters, \$1.50, and towels, \$1.00, help run up the bill.

Game jerseys cost an average \$12.00 each and every player must have two of them. For the benefit of game spectators and the million fans who watch weekly Dow telecasts, teams wear dark jerseys at home, light colored sweaters on the road. Sweater numbering to aid identification costs each team around \$600.00 as Big Four players wear numerals on backs and on the shoulder pads.

Other costs which help run Big Four team annual budgets to well above \$800,000 a season: each player will use \$1.25 worth of elastic and adhesive tape on his ankles for each game and practice. Teams spend more than \$3,000 a year on this item alone. Medical bills depend on the number of injuries but team costs will run anywhere between \$5,000 and \$8,000, park and practice field rental expenses, taxes and administration costs and the figure is not one for a shoestring operator.

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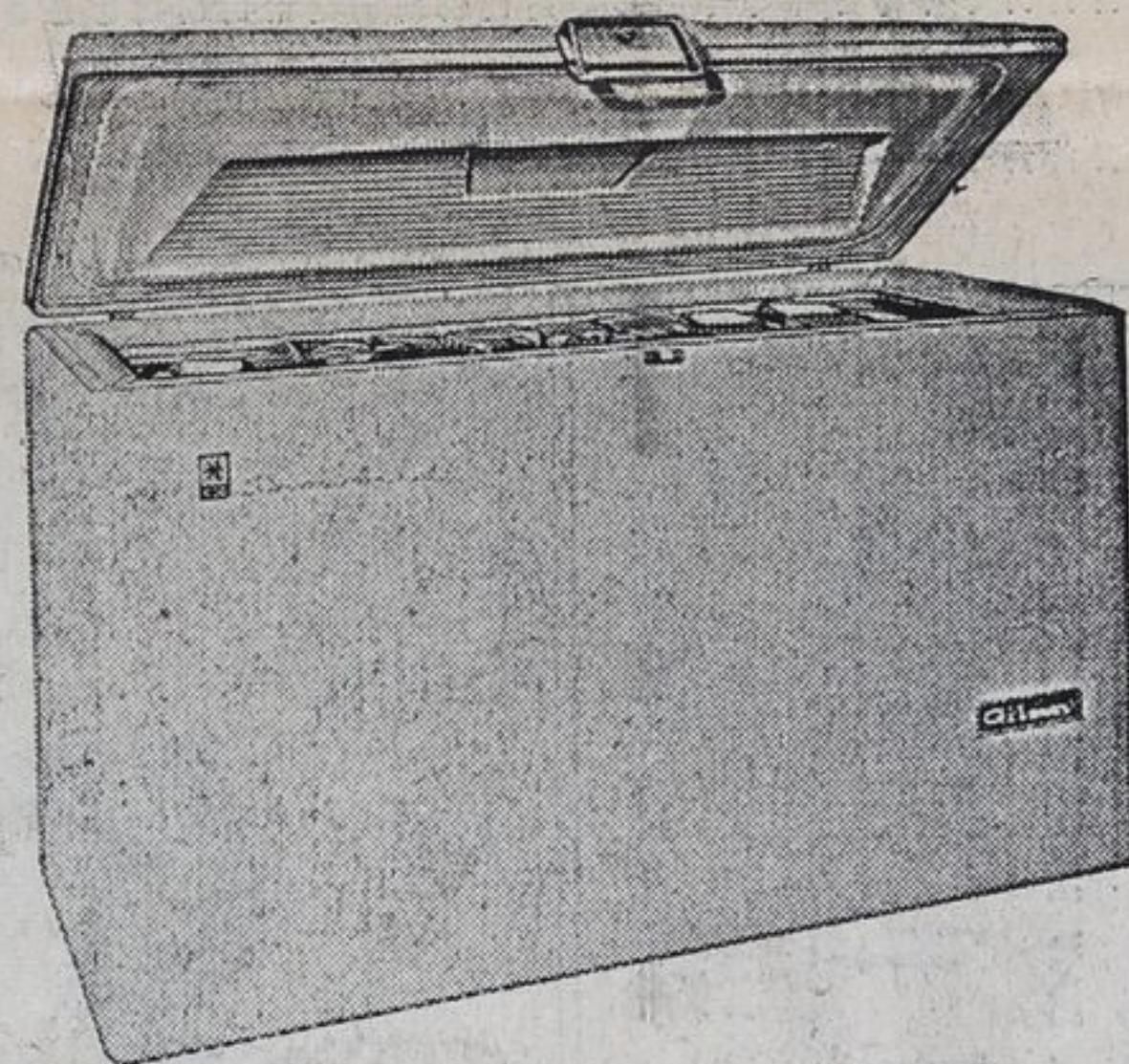
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
