

Offers to Process Area Silver Ores

Faced with the closure of Deloro Smelting and Refining, silver operators of the Cobalt and Gowganda areas and government officials met recently in Haileybury to discuss methods of providing alternative services. As reported several weeks ago, Deloro, which for over 50 years has been the silver refiner for the Cobalt area mines, is to shut down this month.

While the government made no official commitment, it was stated at the meeting that under no circumstances would the government allow closure of the Cobalt and Gowganda area owing to the cut off of the Deloro services.

As a result of the meeting mine operators of the district have formed a committee to explore ways and means of providing their own refining services in the Cobalt area.

Since the meeting American Smelting and Refining has offered to handle all the production from Cobalt and Gowganda at its East Helena smelter in Montana. Under the Asarco proposal operators would receive approximately the same price for their silver as they had been receiving from Deloro.

In the meantime, the committee of operators under H. E. Cawley of Agnico Mines at Cobalt and J. M. Carter of McIntyre Mines' Castle-Tretheway operation at Gowganda will consider proposals through which the mines might refine their own concentrates within the Cobalt area.

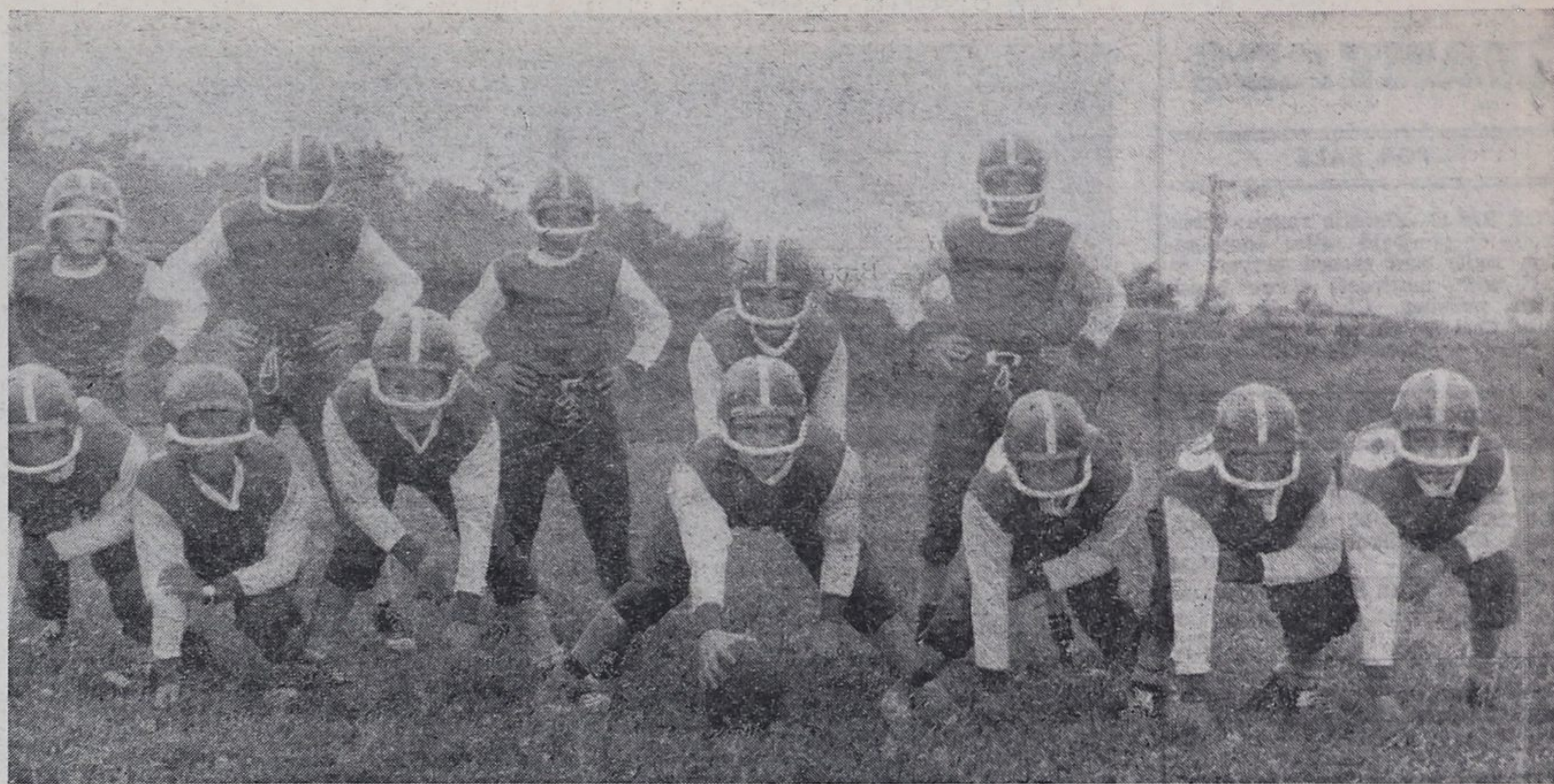
Their first dance is to be held in the Legion Hall, on Friday, October 21.

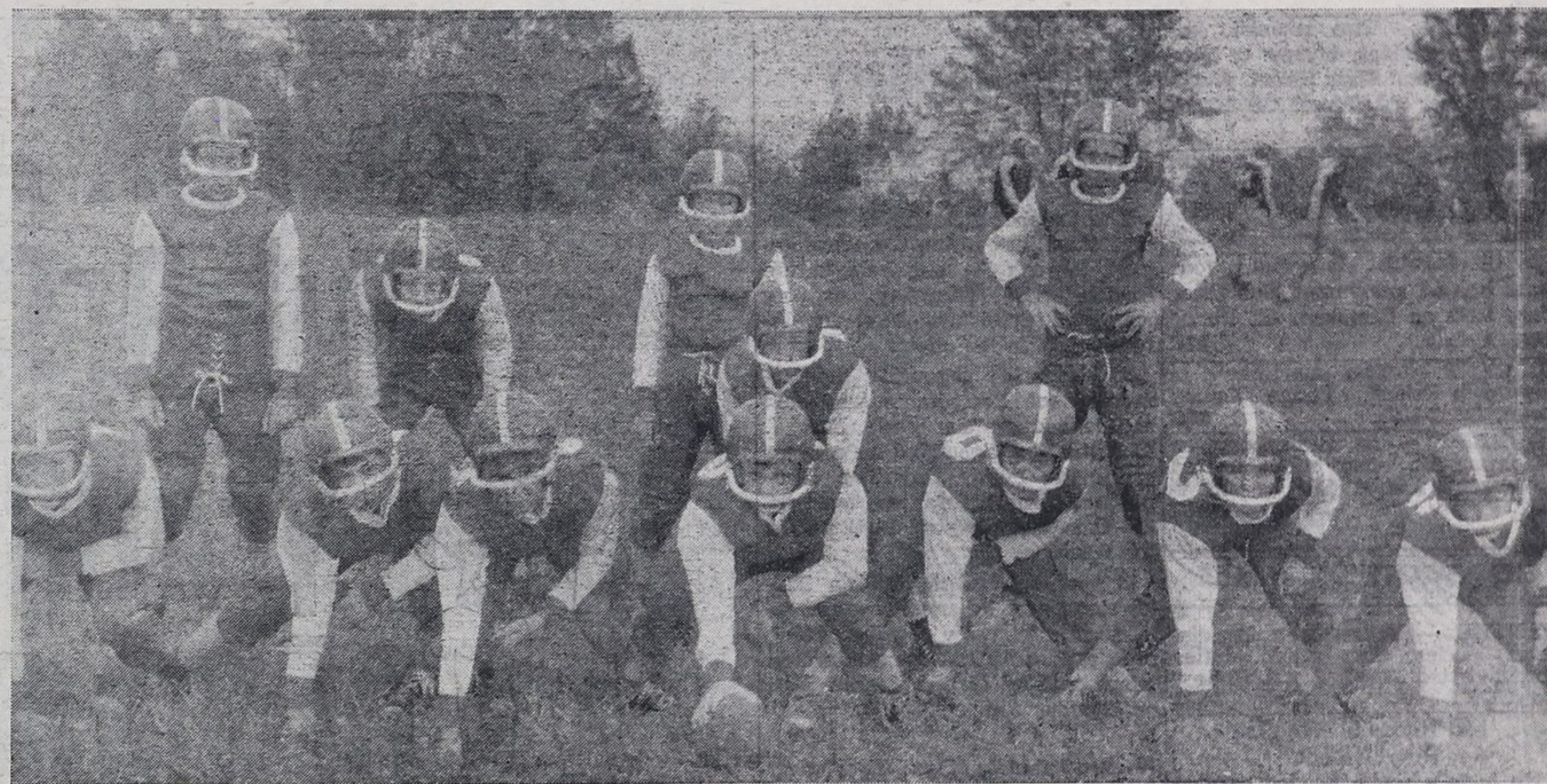
