Crisp blocking allowed the Roughriders to make long gains on several end runs. From the Ti-

Cat 25 yard line, O'Malley executed an expert fake and sent diminutive Lionel Roy around left end for a touchdown. The convert missed.

Haileybury 12, New Liskeard 6. After an exchange of kicks, the Roughriders struck again from the Ti-Cat 35 yard line. White took an O'Malley pitchout and went all the way behind good blocking. The convert attempt was wide. Haileybury 18, New Liskeard 6.

The third and fourth quarters were scoreless. With the minute flag up in the fourth quarter, the Ti-Cats came up with a tremendous defensive effort to hold the Roughriders for three plays on the Liskeard one-yard line.

Final score: Haileybury 18, New Liskeard 6.

Liskeard Ti-cats Take First Win

The Ti-Cats on the other hand looked sharp and alert in providing effective blocking for their ball carriers. The next game, scheduled for Saturday, October 22, at 1:00 p.m. in New Liskeard should be a real thriller. The following day the teams will meet in Haileybury at 2:00 p.m. for the final game of the season.
