Deer Season Opens On November 1

The open season for deer in that part of the North Bay District north of the Mattawa River, French River and Lake Nipissing commences on Tuesday, November 1, and runs through until November 25th.

It has been erroneously reported that this area opens on October 31st. While this error is regrettable, it cannot be used as a legal excuse to "jump the gun" and Conservation Officers patrolling the district may lay charges against any hunters who attempt to hunt deer before the season legally commences.

Of special interest is the area south of the French and Mattawa Rivers including the District of Parry Sound, Muskoka (except the townships of Medora and Wood) and the south part of Nipissing, where there will be an open season for moose coinciding with the deer season from November 7th to 19th. A special licence is available for \$26.00 which enables the holder to take one moose OR one deer but not both. It is not permissible to hold an ordinary deer or moose licence as well as the special combination licence.

Brownie Pack Helps UNICEF

COBALT — The School Board of the Township School Area of Cobalt and Coleman met last week for the regular meeting.

Those present were chairman I. Tresidder, trustees W. Fleming, H. A. Todd, L. Othmer, D. F. Horan, secretary-treasurer, Mrs. A. Cameron and the principal, D. C. McGugan.

The attendance officer, Mrs. Lila Dixon reported that pupil attendance in September was exceptionally good and no absentee calls were made.

The principal reported an enrolment of 362, average daily attendance 96.48.

Ontario Education Week will be observed November 6-12. The theme to be "Education — Key to the Future".

Plans are under way to hold an 'Open House' in conjunction with this.

Due to the crowding of the classrooms, the Board is giving serious consideration to building two new rooms at a cost between \$65,000, and \$70,000.00 Enrolment for each of the Grades is as follows: Kindergarten, 32; Grade 1, 56; Grade 2, 55; Grade 3, 36; Grade 4, 38; 5, 38; Grade 6, 41; Grade 7, 34 and Grade 8, 32.

Counterfeiter

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her their three children.

Troscinski said that he intended to follow his family if he could not get the counterfeiters to stop pressuring him.

He alleged that later a Joe Smith from Vancouver visited his shop and threatened him, and he also received a number of threatening telephone calls. Once two men came in the shop and threatened him at gunpoint.

Troscinski said that he only made the bills to satisfy the counterfeiters, and that he deliberately made them of poor quality. He used bleached out one dollar bills to print \$50 and \$100 bills on them.

Cross examined by Crown Attorney George Black, Troscinski could not say why he did not go to the police for protection. But he said that he is still afraid that the gang may molest his family.

Defence attorney P. J. Burns of Kirkland Lake said that the court should take into consideration that Troscinski acted under duress.

Judge Robinson said that under Section 17 of the Criminal Code, certain crimes could be excused, if the person doing them was being actually threatened at the time he committed them, and providing there was no conspiracy. However, he could not accept this as an excuse in this case. He suggested to Mr. Burns that for Troscinski's own protection he should also plead guilty to a charge of manufacturing counterfeit money. This will not, however, affect the amount of penalty imposed by the court, Judge Robinson added.

Troscinski was remanded one week for a probation report.
