Funeral services were conducted in St. John's Anglican Church for Frederick W. Widdifield, with Rev. A. L. Chabot officiating. The graveside service was in charge of Branch 33 of the Canadian Legion and members of their Pipe Band.

Mr. Widdifield, whose death occurred suddenly on November 3rd, in the New Liskeard and District Hospital, was born in Pine Orchard on July 14, 1887. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. M.
