

At this time Bethlehem was overcrowded with those who had come from all parts of the land to be enrolled. Even the inn was filled. There was no place for those two weary people to stay after their long tire-

Finally they found shelter in a stable, where cattle slept, spent the night there; because there was no room in the inn, Christ was born in a stable. He wos laid in a manger, instead of a cradle and Mary, his mother wrapped him in swaddling clothes. He should be called Jesus for he came to save his people.
