Winter Ice Fishing Is Popular Sport

The winter ice fishing season is in full swing on Lake Temiskaming, Lake Nipissing and scores of other favourite locations throughout Ontario. According to officials of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests thousands of fishermen will visit Ontario Lakes every week-end until the ice breaks up. Most of them will take home catches of perch, whitefish, herring, lake trout, pickerel and pike.

Ice fishing has increased in popularity until now it is a major factor in the economy of many resort areas. A longer open season for pickerel, May 15 to March 31, has brought about a tremendous increase in tourist business in the North.

Ice fishing is regarded as one of the most attractive of winter sports. On most lakes, small huts are rented by residents, the huts containing a small but effective stove and a bench for the reclining fisherman. Equipment is simple, usually consisting of a handline and a hook which is lowered to the most favourable depth for the type of fish sought. The depth ranges from perhaps 15 to 20 feet for perch and pike, as much as 40 or 50 for whitefish and even deeper, in some cases, for lake trout. In the latter case, most experienced fishermen use a shiny spinner or spoon as bait; most popular all-round bait is the minnow, fished close to the bottom.

Favoured by lake trout fishermen is Lake Timagami, 50 miles south of New Liskeard, where residents and tourist operators have attempted, with considerable success, to establish winter angling. Winter roads lead over the ice to favourite spots, perhaps five or six miles from Timagami village, to fishing huts. Lake trout up to 25 pounds in weight have been taken out of Timagami's ice-holes, although anglers say "there are much bigger trout in the lake than have yet been caught."

On most Ontario lakes, huts are rented for \$3 to \$5 a day. The operator provides fuel, fishing tackle and all the necessary equipment. The fisherman drives to his favourite spot, gets out of his car and is driven to and from the fishing hut. Some huts accommodate two, some four, people.

The rules are simple: Sit and wait for the fish to bite. A conservation officer of the Department may drop in to see that the rules and limits are being observed. He'll probably also give a few tips on how best to land the fish — whitefish, perch, lake trout, pickerel or pike.

Dozens of fishermen from all over Ontario will be in Temagami next week-end to try for the big prizes being offered by the Temagami Winter Carnival Committee.

KENORA — A western invader is under study by conservation officers in Northwestern Ontario. It's the black-billed magpie which breeds commonly in Western Canada. One bird was first seen in the Kenora area in June, 1947. Small flocks are now reported wintering in the Sioux Narrows and Minaki area.

"These strikingly marked black and white birds are between 15 and 20 inches long with an extremely long and slender black tail," says

Russ Hall, of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests here. "They're active and wary and when disturbed, fly away chattering loudly."

"The nest is an enormous globe of sticks assembled in the lower branches of trees or shrubs, with nesting cavity in the centre and entrance and exit on opposite sides.

"In places where the magpie is abundant, it is commonly thought of as undesirable. During summer and fall, its diet consists mainly of seeds and insects. In the spring, it is a persistent nest robber and the eggs and young of many small birds are destroyed. The winter months are spent scavenging, often around garbage dumps, much like the raven and Canada jay."

Conservation officers studying history, abundance and present range will welcome accurate information as to where and when the black-billed magpie is seen in the western part of the province.
