Funeral services were held from Holy Cross Church, Thursday, February 23, at 10 a.m. for Alfred Sauve, well-known citizen of the town, whose death occurred in Misericordia Hospital on Monday, February 20, following an illness of three weeks. The funeral mass was in charge of Rev. C. Lapointe.

Born in Point Fortune, Que., 84 years ago, Mr. Sauve spent his early life there and later went to Warren, near Sudbury, where he was married on January 7, 1906, to the former Miss Laurentine Proulx. Twenty-five years later they came with their family to Haileybury.


