Co-operative Effort Advised For District Municipalities

The Tri-Towns should cooperate in attracting tourists to the area. This was part of the advice given by Guy Moore, speaking to the New Liskeard Chamber of Commerce at a banquet held last week.

Mr. Moore is the Deputy Minister of Travel and Publicity

for Ontario. The Deputy Minister pointed out that Kenora, a town of about the same size as the Tri-Towns, would gross more than \$1,000,000 this year during

the ten week tourist season. A recent survey showed that 19,035 cars entered Kenora between July 18 and 23.

He said not only the tourist operator benefits, but merchants too. During the survey it was found that the tourist dollar was split between stores and tourist operators, with the stores getting 60.7 per cent of the dollar.

Mr. Moore said that his department advertises extensively in the United States and Canada and last year received more than 300,000 requests for information.

He suggested that a wonderful opportunity for advertising the Tri-Towns will exist at the new tourist information center to be opened at Barrie this year. This will be the first inland tourist bureau to be opened by the government, and will supplement the 15 bureaus maintained at border points.

Mr. Moore said that New Liskeard has shown great foresight in its beach project, and urged that the expansion should continue, as it is, and will become even more of a tourist

attraction.
