The financial statement of the Children's Aid Society for the district of Temiskaming showed that \$15,000 was received from federal and provincial as well as municipal grants for 1960. The Community Chest and parents provided the balance of money received to cover operating expenses.

A total of \$93,000 was required to cover the expenses of children in foster homes and the balance was devoted to covering administration costs of the Society. Deficit for 1960 was \$4,606.34 and the Society's deficit over the past three years now totals \$16,469.41.
