The visiting committee reported two members ill. Sister Brown thanked the Lodge and members for the cards and flowers received by Mr. Brown during his illness.

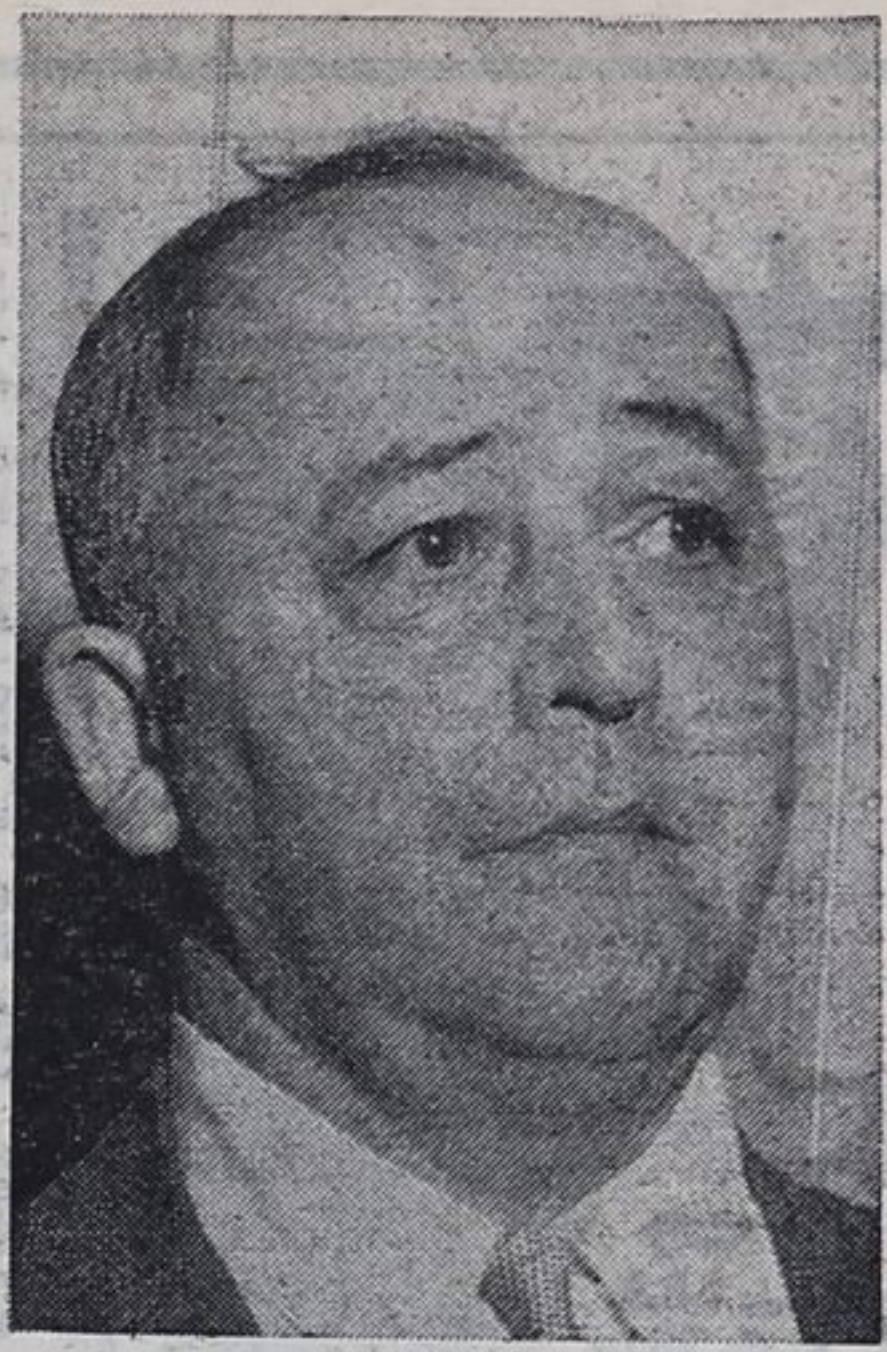
A report was given concerning the chartering of a bus for the School of Instruction which will be held in Englehart sometime in May.

Start Work on Home for Blind

The new CNIB center at Sudbury will be finished by next year, and construction will start within the next few days. The center, which will cost some \$500,000 is specially designed to house 42 blind persons, and will play a key part in rehabilitation and retraining of newly blinded.

Everything in the center is designed to facilitate living conditions for the blind. Sharp corners and steps have been avoided, and every room can be easily identified by a raised pattern on doors and door handles.

The building will be located at the intersection of Prete and York streets, and the contract has been awarded to the Frid Construction Company.

Many organizations and municipalities in the area are contributing to the cost of the building. New Liskeard has promised \$650 spread across three years, and Cobalt has donated \$450 spread across three years. Many local Lions Clubs have also made donations.
