Farmers At School Learn Weed Control

The unending war on weeds in Temiskaming was stepped up last week. Farmers from all over the district gathered at the Demonstration farm for a weed control school.

They heard experts from Southern Ontario, as well as the local farm staff, discuss ways and means of clearing weeds out of the district, and the most effective way of handling weed control equipment.

M. F. Cook, agricultural representative for Temiskaming for the past 30 years or more, was in charge of proceedings and introduced the speakers. The meeting was held in the new agricultural building at the Demonstration Farm.

George Jones, professor of field husbandry of the staff of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph, presided at the morning session which dealt largely with various types of chemicals used to combat the weed menace.

J. K. Fallis, Fields Crops Branch of the Department of Agriculture, Toronto, spoke in the afternoon concerning the type of equipment best suited for use under specified conditions and Ralph Walker, representing a firm of chemical manufacturers from Burlington, was present in the capacity of consultant.

Mr. Fallis explained the relative

merits of the low pressure pumps as opposed to those of the more expensive high pressure type. The broad jet nozzles supplied from a 50-gallon drum carried on the back of a tractor under low pressure were best suited for work on rough or uneven ground or for spraying roadsides, but, he recommended the narrow jet nozzles carried on a 21-foot beam and delivering the spray under high pressure for ordinary field work. The speaker said that chemicals had been developed to deal with all sorts of weeds under varying conditions.

The weed problem is one that has plagued Temiskaming farmers ever since agriculture became established in the district; sowthistle being the chief offender. Old-timers claim that the weed was brought in from Old Ontario and the province of Quebec in the horse feed used in the lumber camps. Be that as it may, once established the weed spread rapidly.

Apparently no concentrated effort was made for its control. The attitude on the part of at least some of the farmers being that sowthistle was just another of those vicissitudes of life that the farmer had to cope with as best he could. The weed itself is not difficult to eradicate by ordinary cultural methods if caught in the early stages of its growth. However, its rapid spread is due to the seed of the plant being carried far and wide on the wind.

It was pointed out at the meeting that with chemicals now available and machines for their application priced reasonably, a combined program of cultivation and spraying would eventually result in getting rid of the pest.

Dedication Service At Baptist Church

On Sunday, June 18th, Dr. Dixon A. Burns, Superintendent of Home Missions, was guest speaker in the Haileybury Baptist Church. At the morning service Dr. Burns spoke on "The Baptists of Ontario and Quebec", among whom he travels extensively, as well as maintaining a home office in Toronto.

At the evening service, a brief dedication service for the recently renovated Sunday School and kitchen accommodations preceded the sermon when Dr. Burns topic was "What do we expect from the church".

At both services special music was rendered by the Junior Choir. On Monday evening a congregational meeting was held in the church when Rev. Alva S. Roblin, representative of the Home Missions in the Northern Association was also present. Several items of business pertaining to the Haileybury Church were dealt with at the meeting. At the close of the meeting refreshments were served by the Ladies' Aid.

Dr. Burns, accompanied by Mrs. Burns, is presently making a tour of the Baptist Churches in the Northern Association.

Heavy Penalties For Bad Driving

The Ontario Safety League came upon a report from England that an M.P. asked in Parliament whether the time was now ripe to declare war on accidents by increasing fines and making penalties more severe. A colleague who replied pointed out that the existing penalty had been fixed at death or mutilation, and forty shillings would not add much to that!

This neat reply raised laughter in the House. But, there is no humour in the background of continuing tragedy enacted non-stop on the motor roads of the world, that led to the discussion.

Penalties handed out on the spot, for law breaking on the highways, are indeed severe at times, the Ontario Safety League points out. The penalties vary widely — there is no consistency in the punishment. But here are some specimen judgements that have been enforced recently.

Failure to stop at a through highway . . . cuts, bruises and \$3,700 damage.

Impaired driving . . . broken arm and jaw; also loss of car, license and job.

Hurry (to get out of the city) . . . seven months in the city hospital.

Inattention past a school area . . . sentence to a lifetime of remorse, for a bright young life extinguished for ever.

The great majority of drivers who break the traffic laws and the rules of common sense, get off scot free. But every thinking driver knows that, when he breaks one of the laws of the road he makes himself liable to two kinds of penalty; he may be sentenced later in Court, or on the spot by collision. There is no appeal from the savage penalties handed out amid twisted metal and shattered glass.
