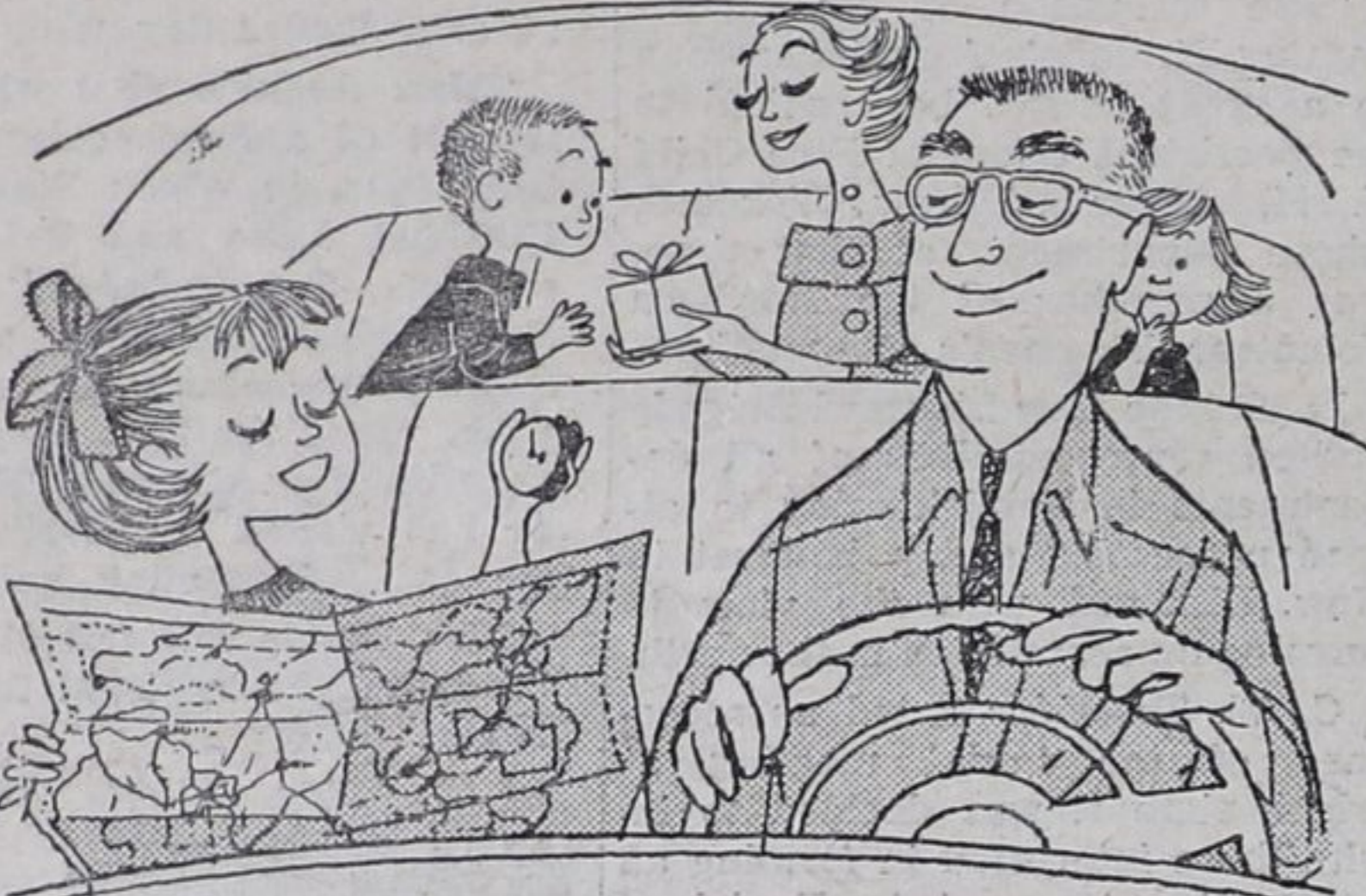

Pickrel Plentiful But Won't Bite

Lands and Forests Department surveys of most of the major waters containing pickerel "have shown that pickerel populations exist in healthy numbers in most lakes and are capable of withstanding a considerably higher rate of exploitation by anglers without causing any detrimental effect to the fishery itself".

Chief problem seems to be the unwillingness of the pickerel to bite.

Biologist R. E. Witfield comments: "The most outstanding problem at present in the management of the pickerel fishery is the reluctance of pickerel to accommodate the angler by biting at the desired time when anglers prefer to spend their leisure hours on the lakes (July and August).

"The reluctance of pickerel to take bait and lures at the desired time seems to be the greatest single problem left to be solved.

"Lakes with exceptionally high concentrations of pickerel are no exception as often this species cannot be any more readily caught from lakes with high concentrations than those which are only carrying mediocre populations.

All waters examined to date except one have shown evidence of natural reproduction occurring. The degree of density of naturally produced pickerel varies somewhat from one lake to another, partly attributable to the natural variable carrying capacity of the lakes themselves.

Cobalt Legion to Improve Cemetery

Many improvements are being made this summer to the veterans' cemetery plot at Haileybury, owned by Branch 44 of the Canadian Legion at Cobalt.

The branch bought the plot in 1948. It measures 330 by 140 feet on the north side of the road leading to the Mount Pleasant cemetery at Haileybury. Volunteer work groups have started to mark out the burial plots, lay out walks and construct a new roadway.

"We want to make it a really lasting and fitting tribute to Northern Ontario's veterans," a Legion spokesman said.

Burial plots for veterans are provided at a very nominal cost. That the deceased is a veteran is the only provision, and recently a veteran from British Columbia was buried there. Any veteran who would like to donate a few hours work is asked to get in touch with the Cobalt Legion.

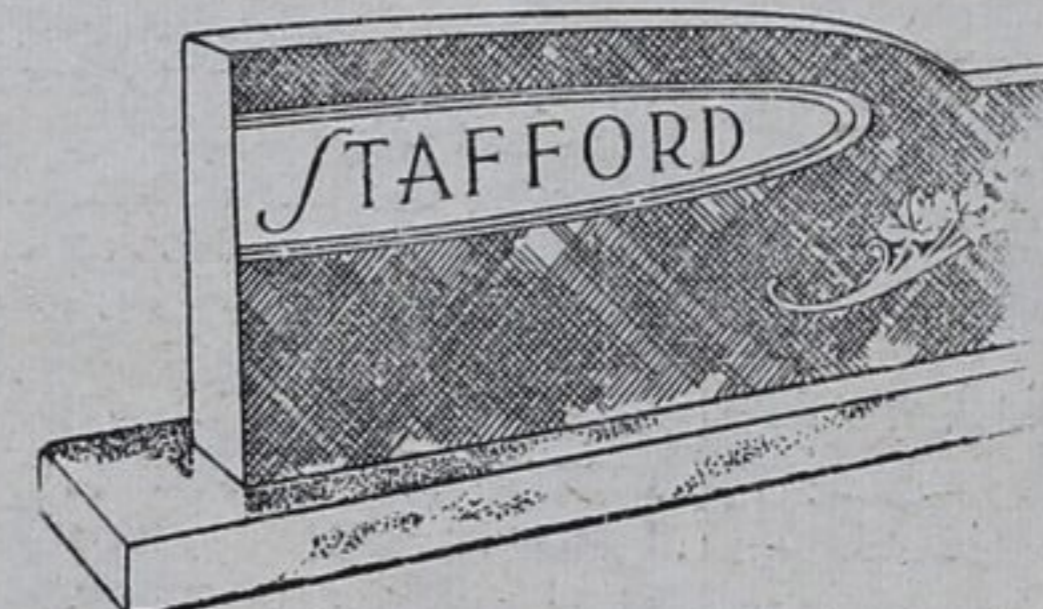
