## Obey Canuck Law Americans Urged

LANSING, Michigan — James M. Hare, Chairman of the Michigan State Safety Commission, to-day asked American motorists traveling in Canada during the Dominion Day — Independence Day week-end to obey all Canadian traffic laws.

"Falling as they do on July 1 and July 4, these traditional holidays result in hundreds of thou-

sands of additional tourists using Michigan and Ontario roads," Hare said. "For this reason alone, drivers on both sides of the border should use extra care and courtesy."

Hare reminded his fellow-Americans who are enjoying Ontario's lakes and scenic attractions to obey all Provincial traffic laws.

"During the summer months," Hare said, "our central files in Lansing receive a heavy flow of traffic convictions from Ontario and other Canadian Provinces with which Michigan has reciprocity agreements. These convictions count on the American driver's point record and many a Michigan driver finds to his sorrow that the speeding ticket he got on some rural road in Ontario is the one which finally brings about a 30-day suspension in Michigan."

"Members of the Michigan State Safety Commission hope that the combined efforts of all agencies involved will keep the accident and death toll down on this long July week-end," Hare said. "We hope all American tourists who read or hear this message will respect Canadian hospitality and obey all traffic laws."

## Loaded Agenda for Haileybury Club
