In addition the town would wipe out an outstanding tax bill of some \$3,800, and foot the costs of a survey and the legal expenses. The survey and legal fees would probably total around \$7,000.

All the costs involved would be assessed to the home owners now living on the Mastermet property and the town would recover all its expenditures when the lots were sold to the residents now using the ground.
