Peter Knechtel of Kitchener won the 1960 juvenile honors and Randy Dunk of St. Catharines took the bantam crown, and they will both be competing in district qualifying play on July 7. The finals for Ontario titles are booked at St. Catharines Golf Club on July 14.

Bob Panasiuk of Windsor's Roseland Club, winner of the 1960 junior honors has since turned professional and naturally will not be eligible.

This leaves the junior division open to several strong contenders who have been impressive in the province's amateur tournaments throughout the past two years.
