The Supreme Court of Canada has ruled it illegal to operate automatic coin laundries on Sunday.

The nine member court upheld the judgement of the Ontario Court of Appeal ruling that operation of automatic coin laundries on Sundays constitutes a breach of the Lord's Day Act.

The courts judgement followed a test case appeal to determine whether the growing number of automatic laundries may remain open on Sundays even if no one is on hand to supervise.

Cobalt Controls Sasaginaga Lake

Cobalt has sanitary control over Lake Sasaginaga and the adjoining water shed area as far south as Bass Lake. The town council learned this at its council meeting Tuesday night.

Recently the council became disturbed over reports that boats were using Sasaginaga, from which the town draws its water supply. Town clerk Bob Bond, investigated with the Temiskaming Health Unit, and discovered that Cobalt was given sanitary control of the area in 1917.

At that time a special bill was passed in the provincial legislature giving Cobalt sanitary control of the area. This is believed to have been the first bill of its kind passed in the province, and was later used as a model for a similar bill giving Teck township sanitary control over the watershed area there.

Council warned that it will prosecute anyone using Sasaginaga Lake for boating, or otherwise polluting the lake.
