Changes Rates

Hamilton reminded Canadian mailers that recently-announced convice between Canada and the United States came into effect on July 1, 1961. Under the new convention, there were changes in par- ley, first class honors. cel post and newspaper rates from Canada to the United States, and an increase in registration indemnity for articles posted in Canada and destined for the United States.

Postmaster General Hamilton, in honors. reminding the mailing public of the changes, pointed out that under the new agreement the weight limit on parcels mailed in Canada honors. to the United States had been increased from 15 pounds to 25 pounds and that the maximum indemnity for the loss of a registered article mailed in Canada to the United States has been raised from \$25.00 to \$100.00.

Under the new rate, Canadian parcels mailed to the United States will require postage ranging from 40 cents for a one-pound parcel to \$4.00 for a 25-pound package. Registration fees on mail for the United States will now be identical with domestic rates, ranging from \$.20 for a maximum indemnity of \$25.00 to \$.40 for a maximum indemnity of \$100.00.
