> Forest fires are generally divided into three classes - - surface; ground and crown fires.

Surface fires run over the ground, burning in the top layer of the dry litter, grass, weeds, small bushes etc. They are usually very hot and spread rapidly with a fair amount of flame. Some typical areas are old burns, open areas of grass, hay fern etc.

Ground fires burn in the thick -, layers of decaying humus and ... other vegetation. These layers are more compact and usually contain more moisture than the top .. layer of duff and litter. > Crown fires are those in which the foliage of the trees is consumed. This is the most difficult type. of fire to control; it spreads through the tops of trees at a rapid rate and is usually in dense coniferous stands of timber.

It is important to recognize the three types since suppression methods required in each case are different. Small fires are usually ground or surface fires. On a large " fire, all three may be present in " different sectors.
