The Bible To-day

Soon after the formation of the new Province of Uganda and Ruandi - Arundi, Bishop Brazier of the new diocese of Ruanda stated that the day of missionary enterprise in that part of Africa is not finished. Opportunities have never been so great and recruits are urgently needed.

"Africa is shouting for freedom," said the Rev. T. Gregory Smith,

educational secretary of Ankole and Kibezi.

"But independence won't bring freedom. Only Christ can make men free."

To enable Africans to learn about Christ, from the Word of God in their own tongue, the Rev. Dr. Stanley Smith has just finished the translation of the Bible for the Angole - Kigezi. The three language areas where the Ruanda Mission has been working for forty years now will have the Bible in their own tongue, Miss Rosemary Guillebund having just completed the task for Urundi started by her father Archdeacon Guillebund, many years before.

One African woman testified at a recent meeting in Uganda and said, "most of you know the home I come from. My husband and all his people are heathen and everytime I read my Bible my husband, or one of his family beats me. Last week I lost my temper and said many bad things. Please pray for me that when they beat me for reading my Bible I may be like the Lord Jesus when he was beaten in the courts of Annas, Caiaphas and Pontius Pilate."

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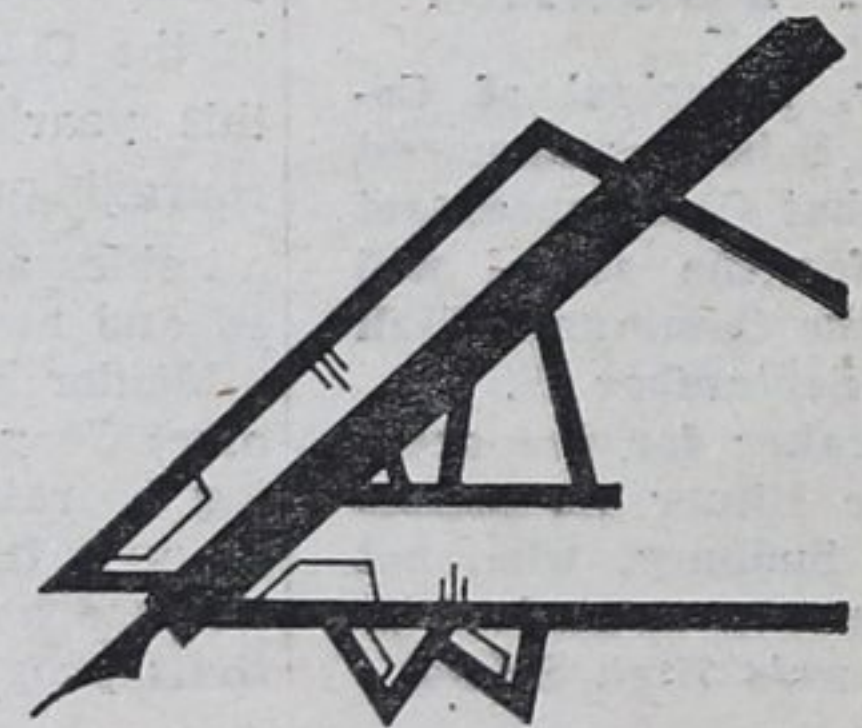
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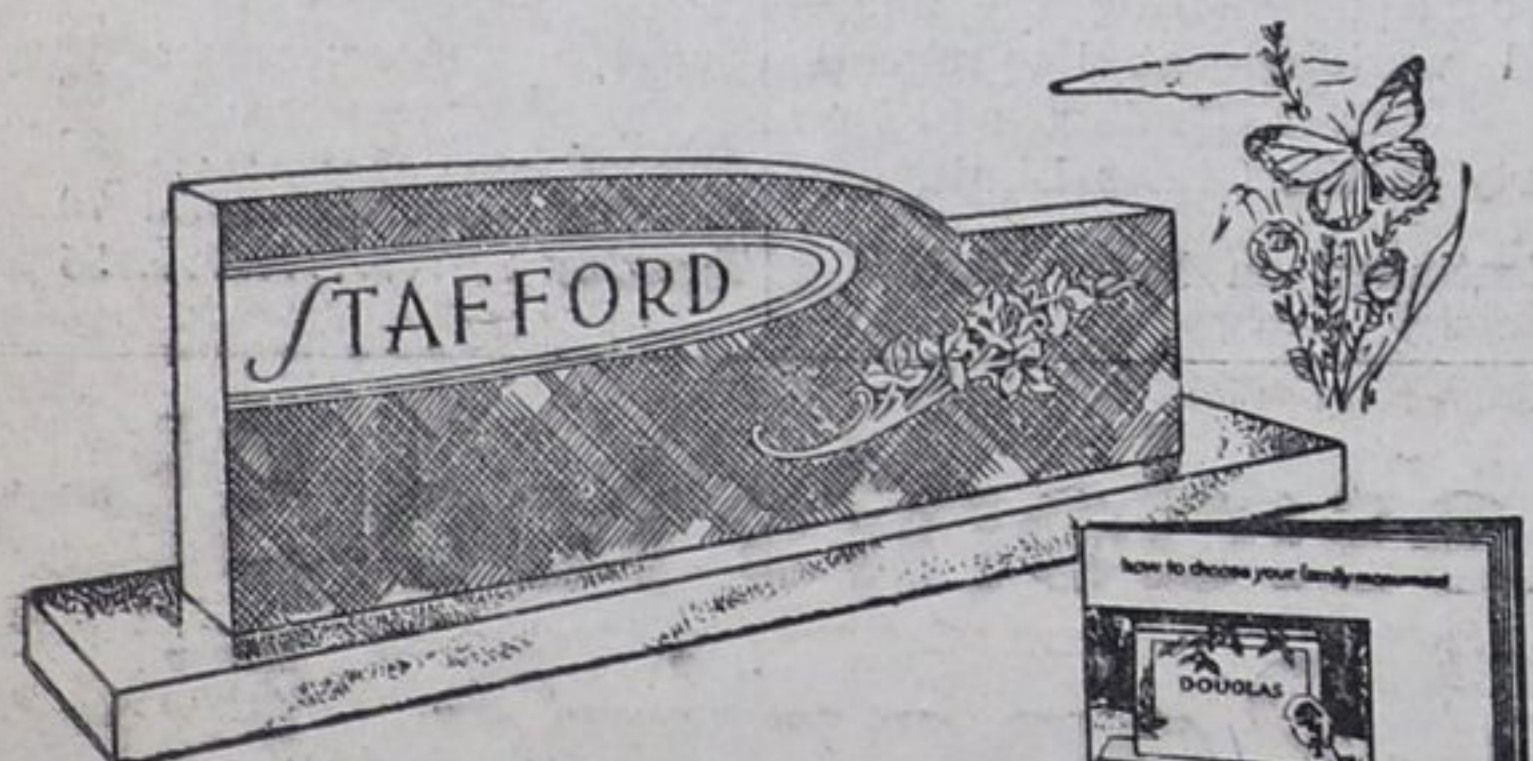
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
