Ontario Teachers Make Trip Possible

Transportation for two African students to come to Canada for further education has become an undertaking of the Federation of Women Teachers' Associations of Ontario.

"The two girls, Feligana Metho of Kenya and Millicent Fraser of Sierra Leone, have sponsors for their stay in Canada and for their attendance at school or university," said Miss Cora Bailey, Peterborough, president-elect of the Federation. "But they were without transportation funds.

"This is the first time in the history of Federation that we have sponsored students through the African Student Foundation," she said.

Miss Metho, sponsored by South Peel Unitarian Church, will be residing in Brampton. For the 1961-62 school year she will be attending Brampton Collegiate Institute, completing her entrance requirements for the University of Toronto. Miss Fraser, sponsored by Huron College, University of Western Ontario, will be attending that University.

Miss Metho was chosen for this trip to Canada by the African Educational Trust while Miss Fraser was suggested by the selection committee of the African Students Foundation.
