GODERICH — For the police force in this quiet town, a recent Wednesday was just one of those days.

First, the alarm of a bank kept starting and the noise attracted crowds of curious citizens. The warning system was undergoing repairs.

There was a moment of confusion at the town fountain when Constable Harold Creedon, bent over for a drink, thought someone was shooting at him.

Then the town's fire siren began sounding. A short circuit apparently set it off.

TOKYO — Suematsu Anzai prided himself on being one of Tokyo's best pickpockets. He laid claim to a list of 5,000 victims and a total of 50 years behind iron bars.

On September 9, Anzai, now 74, was released for the 18th time from prison.

Two days later he got itchy fingers and was nabbed while trying to lift a 50-year-old woman's handbag.

Police quoted the veteran as saying: "My high blood pressure slowed me down."

MADRID — Spanish Sculptor Juan Cristobal died recently. He was 64. His best known works include the statues of El Cid, legendary Spanish hero of the 11th century, in Burgos, and that of the late Dominican dictator, Generalissimo Trujillo, in Ciudad Trujillo.

STOCKHOLM — It's quite a leap from St. Jerome, Que., to Stockholm — even for a polished ballet dancer.

But Jacques Delisle has made it successfully.

After seven years in the Swedish capital, he is master of ballet in the Stockholm Opera.

SUTTON — Georgina Township police said they suspect foul play in the death of a person whose skeleton was found this week under a bush near here.

The skeleton, believed to be that

of a man dead about a year, has been sent to the attorney-general's laboratory in Toronto.

It was found by George Hudson Sr., while he was hunting with his son near this village a mile south of Lake Simcoe.

LONDON, Ont. — Two young girls here have no trouble finding the lucky four-leaf clover. Susan Brown, 12, an old hand, has found more than 200 in the last year. Her 11-year-old friend, Dolly Timmerman, has just started, but picked up 17 the first day.

VICTORIA — Adoptions are increasing in British Columbia but there is a severe shortage of prospective homes for children of mixed racial origin, says Mary King, child welfare superintendent. Some are placed in homes outside the province and in the United States.

BURKS FALLS — A Grade XII student said he was ordered to leave the high school here recently because he did not stand when God Save the Queen was played during assembly.

Andrew Fraser, 18, said he "never really believed in the song as a national anthem" but had always stood before. He stood while O Canada was played.

Andrew said Principal C. M. Dawson told the pianist to stop playing and "told me to leave the school".

Neither Mr. Dawson nor Harvey Fowler, school board chairman, would comment.

But the boy said the principal visited him at home Tuesday and told him it was up to the inspector whether he could return to school.

Andrew said his widowed mother was "not too happy" when she heard what happened but "now I think she's behind me."

PRINCE ALBERT — Paul Brennan, 28, of Kirkland Lake, who escaped from a work gang at the Saskatchewan Penitentiary here recently was recaptured a day later by two civilians.

Brennan was caught by Ronald Clark and Robert Wilkinson near Lily Plain, about 15 miles west of here. He was sentenced to an additional two years in penitentiary on a charge of escaping lawful custody.

He had two years left of a six-year sentence for robbery when he escaped.

BINGHAMPTON, N.Y. — Every-time Harry Sarkisian gets a business going, the army orders him to active duty.

When Master Sgt. Sarkisian, 49, reports October 1 with the called-up 464th reserve engineer battalion, it will be the third time he has had to close a business.

When the army called in 1942, Sarkisian closed his restaurant. In 1951, he closed a record and ice cream shop. Now he can't decide whether to sell or lease his barber shop.

CALGARY — A pay-as-you-catch system of fishing will be used in the \$1,500,000 family fun centre to be built on the Trans-Canada highway west of Calgary. The centre's waters will be stocked with fish.

ST. HYACINTHE, Que. — Mrs. Benoit Beauchemin, wife of a Beloeil, Que., farmer, has given birth to an 18-pound boy in a St. Hyacinthe hospital, it was announced recently.

The attending physician, Dr. Remi Dansereau, said mother and son, are doing well.

For the 38-year-old Mrs. Beauchemin, who weighs 250 pounds and is 5 feet 10 inches tall, it was her 14th child, of whom 12 are living.

In June 1960, she gave birth to a boy weighing 17 pounds 2 ounces and the baby preceding him weighed 13 pounds at birth.

Dr. Dansereau said the average weight of a child at birth is about eight pounds.

ST. INGEBERT, Germany—Henk Luycx, 24, a Dutch lion tamer with a local circus, didn't show up for his performance recently. He had been bitten by a mouse.

Luycx, who handles five tigers, said the mouse bit his hand, causing blood poisoning.

"Tigers are friendlier than those mice", he said. "Mice are pretty lousy characters."

AUCKLAND, N.Z. — On the maiden voyage of the liner Oriana 10,000 ashtrays disappeared as souvenirs. But for the maiden voyage the liner Canberra it was equipped with the ugliest and heaviest ashtrays available — and all were present after she arrived here.

GALVESTON, Tex. — Fred L. Carson says it may have been "the night of the tornado to some people, but to me it was the night the dog sat on my face."

Carson's legs were pinned beneath slowly-setting debris for than five hours after a tornado destroyed the apartment house where he lived.

His chief thought during the ordeal, he said today, was the growing irritation at "that fool dog that kept sitting all over my face." He couldn't make the boxer leave.

"It didn't even belong to me, that fool dog," he said.

NORTH BAY — Lieutenant-Governor J. Keiller Mackay Saturday night told members of the Royal Canadian Legion to be steadfast to their traditions and responsibilities.

He was speaking to some 300 members and wives at the 35th anniversary banquet of Branch 23 of the Legion.

"This sense of responsibility which you men have shown during critical war-time years, when you were called upon to do so, must be perpetuated in your children, upon whose shoulders the direction and life of our country will soon fall," he said.

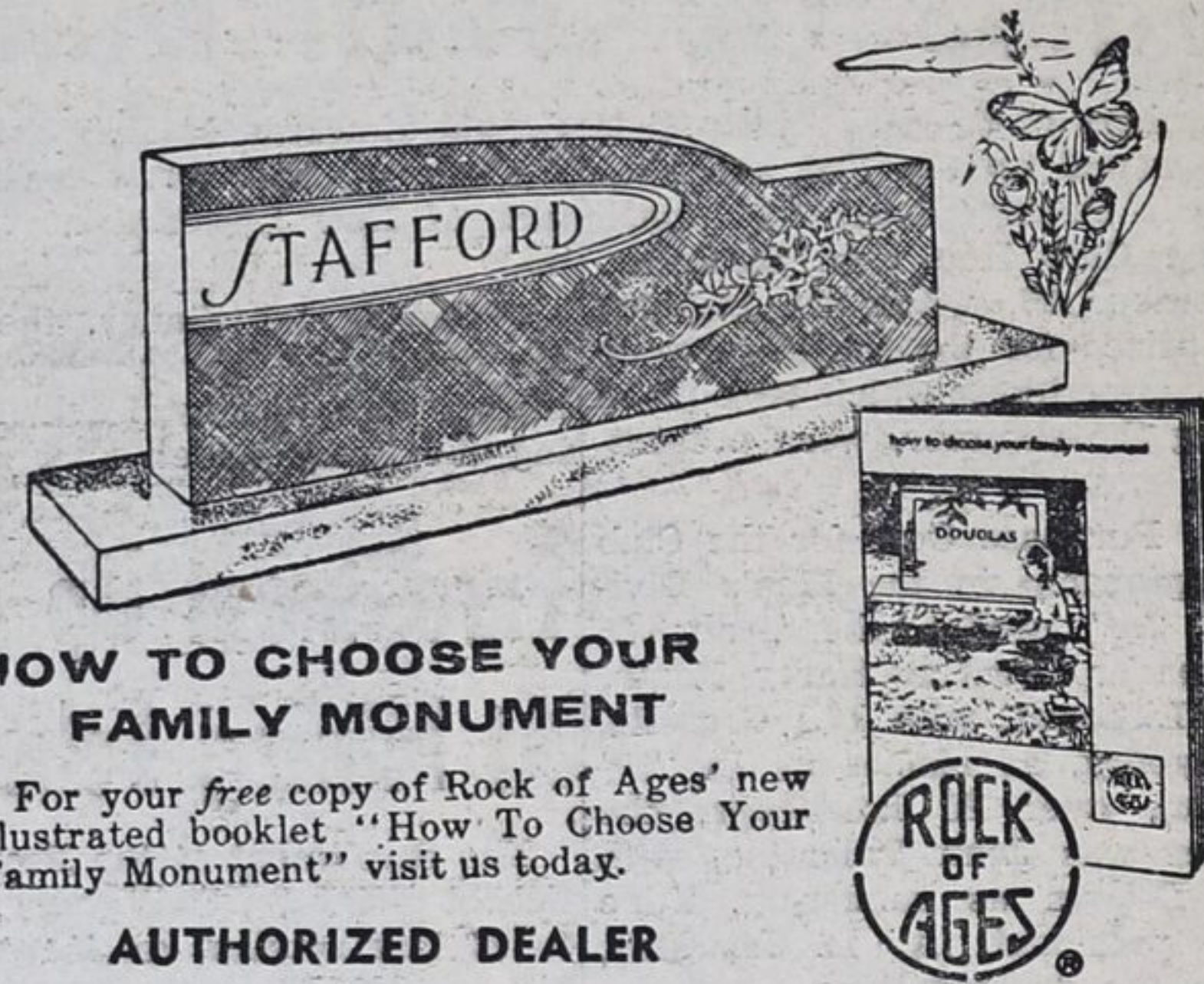

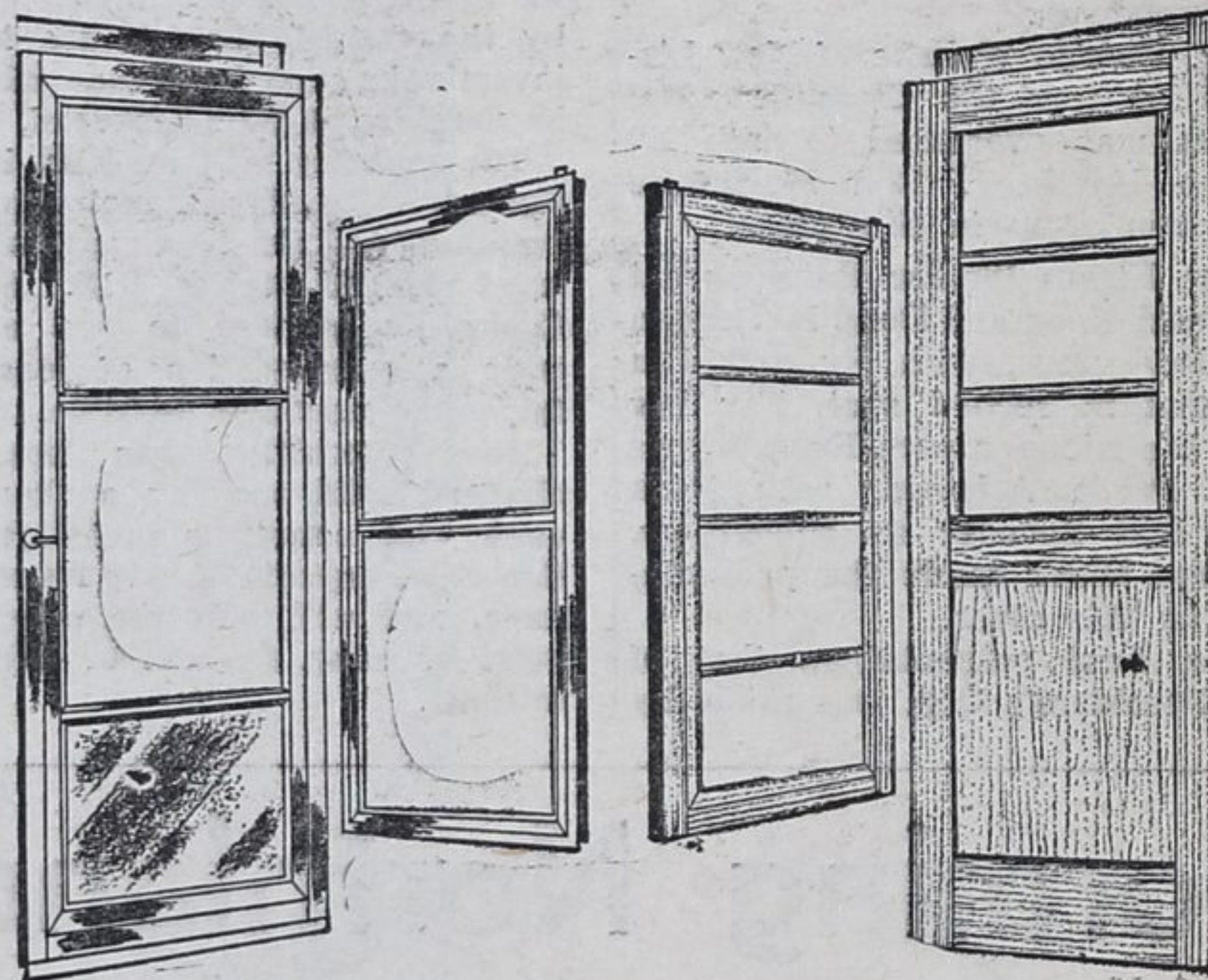
