

Cubs Win League Opener Will Play At Home Friday

New Liskeard Cubs will start their regular schedule in the Kirkland and District Juvenile League at the Memorial Arena on Friday night, and prepared for the big win with an encouraging warm-up and shakedown on Tuesday at Kirkland Lake.

The Cubs met Kirkland Legion in the league opener, and came out of it with a handy 7-6 win in the free scoring opener.

Peter Grant, a last year regular started the scoring for the Cubs with an unassisted counter early in the first period, and then Legion lowered the boom.

Before the end of the first period, Watt, Hamilton, Lawless and Mervyn had beaten Jean-Paul Grenon and McNabb added another in the first two minutes of the second stanza which counted up to an easy win for the Vets.

It took Ron Chitaroni to shake

the Cubs out of the rut, and he did it with two smart goals less than a minute apart. John Haines and

Jerry Lawless fed a fast break to McNabb in the first minute of the last period to give Legion the lead and it took Denny Conlin's unassisted break to pull the game even again.

Murray Black, the Haileybury speedball, took a pass from John

Haines to move the Cubs in front again, and they were able to hold off the hard-pressing Legion for the final six minutes and a cliff-hanging win.

Coach Don Shepherdson said he was satisfied with the showing his team had made in the first game.

"We were a little loose defensively," he said, "but this will be looked after. We have a good core of rearguards, and all they will need is a little practice together."

"I was more worried about our scoring punch," he admitted, "but it looks as if our forwards are going to take over from where our good front lines left off last year."

The Bible To-day

Seventeen Gospels in nine different languages were printed last year under the auspices of the Austrian Bible Committee. Mr. Kar Uhl, the General Secretary stated at the Annual Meeting of the Committee that one or more Gospels were printed in Nyiha (East Africa); Toba (Argentina); Gora (India); Masana (Cameroun); Gogo (Tanganyika); Luyia and Ilamba (Kenya); Macedonian (Yugoslavia); and Nepali (Nepal).

The cost of printing about \$10,000 was met by the Austrian Bible Committee with assistance from the Evangelical Missionary Society of Stuttgart, Germany, gifts made by a youth group in Stuttgart and an international youth Conference held in Hemeln in Germany.

This printing by the Austrian Bible Committee will help with the increasing circulation of Scriptures, particularly in Africa. The million Gospel campaign begun in 1960 is still in operation. Over three million Gospels in ninety-six languages have now been distributed.

They used to carry off children, destroy crops, kill livestock, and generally terrify the population. Departed spirits revisited their families, people went from door to door demanding food to stock up for the long winter, and a pretty miserable time must have been had by all.

Nowadays of course it's a lot more fun. Children look forward to Hallowe'en excitedly and really let loose when the night arrives. We adults have the comfort of knowing that the ghosts and witches we meet are harmless, and will probably disappear when given a handful of jellybeans.

Perhaps though, we have our own brand of lurking demons . . . accidents. They're a lot more likely to appear on Hallowe'en than on any other night, and they spoil the fun in no time, which is why the Ontario Safety League once more offers you some tips to help ward off these evil spirits.

At home, try using a flashlight in the jack-o'-lantern instead of the traditional hazardous candle. Light your porch and clear obstacles from the garden to discourage pranksters and avoid tumbles in the dark. Help make your children visible to drivers by dressing them in light colored costumes, or decorating dark ones with reflective tape. And to help them see better, use makeup disguises instead of masks.

Above all, if you drive, be doubly cautious on October 31st, and keep a watchful eye out for those 20th Century Hallowe'en spooks — our children.
