What a flood of memories a short item in a newspaper can bring to mind! Last Friday morning, when glancing through the Bracebridge Herald-Gazette, one of the weeklies received in this office, I noticed in their "twenty years ago" column, the announcement of the death of Rev. William Farmer, at the age of 81. He was in charge of the Englehart and Tomstown Presbyterian churches in 1918, and in August of that year was the minister who married my husband and I. In those days there were no cars or paved roads and Mr. Farmer drove from Englehart to our home, a distance of nine miles, with a horse and buggy. There was one part of the road that was extremely bad, and coming through a deep mudhole, both traces, (to the uninitiated they were the leather straps that attached the horse to the buggy), broke. Fortunately, it happened right in front of a farmhouse, and although there was no one at home (they were all down at our place, waiting for the wedding ceremony to start), he went in and hunted around the stable until he found several pieces of haywire to do a repair job. Despite the delay, he was only a little over half an hour late. But I can tell you, it seemed like two hours to me!

Mr. Farmer was born in Jedburgh, Scotland, coming to Canada in 1907. He was ordained as a Presbyterian minister in 1915, and was superannuated in 1928, making his home afterwards in Bracebridge.

Have you ever tried to get a recipe from one of those good old fashioned cooks who never follow a "recept" but just go by guess and by gorrah, and never have a failure in anything they ever bake? Well, I have, and this little item cut from the Christian Science

Monitor, I think from John Gould's "Down on the Farm" column, is surely true to life.

"I think it was six cups of flour I used—but I don't use a measuring cup. I just take a tea-cup out of the cupboard and dip. No, I don't sift it. Then I kind of guess how many cups I've used, and put in two teaspoons of baking powder for each cup. Somewhere near. That would be, two-times-six — 12 teaspoons, wouldn't it? So, now let's see — some salt. I guess a tablespoon. You know, you just put in some salt, but I'd say about a tablespoon. Next you have to have shortening, and you want two good gobs of it, a couple about the size of an egg—just what it needs. (Business of holding up both hands with the fingers indicating two medium-large hen's eggs.)

And then I take a pastry cutter, one of those things you mix shortening into flour with, and if I don't have one handy I use my fingers, and I get it feeling just right before I put in the milk. How much milk? Oh, perhaps a quart. About a quart, I'd say. Then when it feels about right, I take it on the board and knead it some—not too much—and cut the biscuits and put them in the pans. Then I shove them in a 450-oven and take them out when they're done. I guess that isn't very much of a receipt, but that's the way I make biscuits."
