### Election Talk Audible As Polling Date Nears

With district elections just a month away, electors are begin-ning to ask questions of possible Tire Blow-Out candidates.

Mayor Fulton Purdy has stated that he will not be running for office again, and Councillor Fern Desjardines said that it is not likely that he will be running for the Mayor's seat. Magistrate Kenrick called it an expensive prank as he le. vied the fine and \$13 in costs.


The Fire Department also thought the lad was lucky he didn't burst a watermain, it would have cost him a lot more.

A North Bay woman, Mrs. A. E., ance. Covey, died in Misericordia Hospital last Sunday, succumbing to injuries received when the car she was driving went out of control and rolled over.
