Jet Tourists At Scotch Cup

The Canadian and U.S. curling champions who compete in the Scotch Cup matches in Scotland next March will have the moral support of a record number of North American fans.

Two 140-seat jets have been chartered by the Scotch Cup Boosters' Club to fly members to the United Kingdom for the 1962 world series of curling.

The matches between the championship curling rinks of Canada, Scotland and the U.S. open March 15 and will be played in Falkirk and Edinburgh. The planes will leave from Toronto and Detroit March 12 and March 13.

Canada is the defending champion in the annual series sponsored by The Scotch Whisky Association. The Hec Gervais rink from Edmonton retained the cup this year after it was won in both 1959 and 1960 by Ernie Richardson's Regina rink.

Chartered planes flew boosters to Scotland for both the 1960 and last year's matches but this is the first time that the huge jets have been used.

Wendy Taylor is suffering from shock, broken teeth, facial lacerations, and there is a possibility that she has a fractured jaw.

The accident is being investigated by OPP Corporal Sid Daley. Both cars are almost total wrecks.
