Mr. Shien will be attached to the permanent staff of the Association, and stationed at North Bay.

Mr. Shieff, whose experience in fur grading and auctioneering ranges over a period of almost 30 years, will now take on the duties of grading furs in a near half-million dollar fur buying area.

Closely following Mr. Shieff's appointment to the Ontario Trappers' Association, pelts are already starting to arrive for the first sale of the season in December.

As grader and auctioneer, he will be handling furs which represent the work of some 1,000 trappers across the province. Last year, Mr. Sheiff graded furs at all five auctions held in North Bay. Prior to his appointment here, he was grader for one of Western Canada's largest fur sales companies.
