Coroner's Jury Rules Mine Death Accidental

A coroner's jury Saturday returned a verdict of accidental death following an inquest into the December 8 death of Stanley Kerr of North Bay. A Temagami Mine employee, Mr. Kerr died of injuries suffered in a 60-foot fall down an underground working.

There were no eyewitnesses to the accident, but mine officials and employees, who reconstructed the scene, said Mr. Kerr had apparently moved a ladder from a safe to an unsafe position. The shift allowed him to fall 60 feet down a shaft into a muck pile.

Along with its decision, the fiveman jury also put forward the following recommendations:

Ladders should be so placed that they are not only safe, but also will not induce workmen to move them to an unsafe position to facilitate work.

No workman should be allowed to move a ladder without the consent of a shift boss.
