N.O.H.A. Convener, Denny Gabriel was appointed President for 1962. Recreation Director Ken Edgar was re-appointed Secretary for the same year.

Should you be sending a card to friends in Paris, the greeting would be "Bonne Annee!" In Spanish, the greeting is "Feliz Año Nuevo!" and in sunny Italy, "Buon Capo d'Anne!"

"Ein Gleuckliches Neues Jahr" is the salutation one might send—or receive from—friends in Germany.

Whatever the language, the words "Happy New Year" represent only the best of wishes for the year ahead.

The Birth of J.M.C. Movement

On August 23, 1949, a group of music-minded friends met at the summer residence of Mrs. Rodigue Boisvert on the shores of Lake Memphremagog. The meeting was inspired by the appeal of a group of young people known as the "Compagnons de l'Art (St-Hyacinthe) who, guided by Father J. H. Lemieux, aimed at propagating an appreciation of the arts in general but especially that of music.

This group had already studied a plan submitted by Gilles Lefebvre and they dreamed at stim-

ulating Canadians throughout the country into following their lead. The movement became known officially as Jeunesses Musicales du Canada.

Ten Years of Progress

1949 - 1950—Three recitals with written commentaries.

1949 - 1950—Three recitals with spoken commentaries; First Music Camp at Mount Orford; First J.M.C. bulletin.

1951 - 1952—Four recitals with spoken commentaries. (A plan which is now standard every season); First exchange of artists between countries (France-Canada).

1952 - 1953—The Journal Musical Canadien a reality; Members now total 15,000 in 25 centers.

1953 - 1954—Members now total 25,000; 15 new centers established.

1954 - 1955—J.M.C. film by the N.F.B.; Gilles Lefebvre elected President of FIJM; The Record Club is launched.

1955 - 1956—The International Congress of the FIJM is held in Montreal; Gilles Lefebvre re-elected President of the FIJM; The "Camp des Arts" established at the Music Camp; Recording by Maureen Forrester released by JMC.

1956 - 1957—Trophy awarded by the Canadian Institute for Adult Education.

1957 - 1958—Movement is expanded to include Western Canada; Introduction of the JMC Festival - Concours.

1958 - 1959—26 JMC members attend 13th FIJM congress at Brussels Exhibition; Annual Meeting of the JMC held in the Parliament at Ottawa; The JMC Musical Chronicle is established; Western series is inaugurated; Recording released by JMC "The Evolution of Music for Two Pianos", by Renee Morisset and Vic-

tor Bouchard.

In 1949 JMC had one Province, six Section, 3,000 members. In 1959 JMC had eight Provinces, 75 Sections, 40,000 members.
