OBITUARY

Mrs. Eliza Meredith

An old resident of the North Country, in the person of Mrs. Eliza Meredith, passed away at the home of her grand-daughter, Mrs. J. R. Whorley, on Saturday last at the ripe old age of ninety-five years and six months. She had been in Haileybury since last August, but had been a resident of the district of Nipissing for the past 42 years. Her former home was in Mattawa.

The late Mrs. Meredith was born in Hagley, Worcester, England, on September 14th, 1830, and came to Canada in 1882. Up to the time of her death, she was in good health and was always of a very cheerful disposition. She was feeling quite as usual on Friday night, and on Saturday morning it was found that she had passed away peacefully in her sleep.

Two daughters and two sons are left to mourn her loss. They are Mrs. Hackenbrogh, of Eau Claire, Ont., and Mrs. W. Clark, of Toronto, and W. H. Meredith, Mattawa, and Joseph Meredith, Eau Claire. Her husband predeceased her some years ago. There are also surviving eighteen grand children and forty-eight great-grand children.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Meredith was held on Tuesday afternoon. The funeral service was conducted in St. Paul's Church by the Rev. A. M. Whiteley of New Liskeard, in the absence of Rev. Canon Hincks, who was called out of town on Monday. A great many friends and acquaintances of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Whorley attended and there were many beautiful floral tributes. Interment was made in Mount Pleasant Cemetery here.

Mrs. Thomas McDonald

Friends of Mrs. Thomas McDonald, View Street, learned with great regret of her death on Tuesday afternoon, although she had been in poor health for almost a year and during recent weeks with no hope of recovery. She was only twenty-eight years old and leaves her husband and three small daughters to mourn her loss. The oldest child is five and the youngest nine months.

The late Mrs. McDonald had been a resident of Haileybury for about 11 years, coming here from her former home in Uno Park, where her father, Mr. Mirron, two brothers and six sisters survive. She became well known and very much respected by a large circle of friends and acquaintances, who all join in extending to the sorrowing husband and children their sincere sympathy.

Taken sick early in 1925, Mrs. McDonald had spent two months in the Weston Sanatorium, from where she returned to her home in November last. Since then she has gradually grown worse until her death.

The funeral will be held this afternoon, when service will be conducted in the Roman Catholic Church, of which deceased was a life-long member. Interment is to be made in the Roman Catholic Cemetery here.

TOWN OF HAILEYBURY

By-Law No.

Being a By-Law for Granting Aid to the Sisters of Providence Hospital WHEREAS it is expedient to grant by way of donation to the Sisters of Providence Hospital the sum of Five Thousand Dollars, and this is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this By-law.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the Municipality according to the last revised Assessment Roll is \$1,360,642.00.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the Debture Debt of the Corporation is \$245,320.02, no part of the principal or interest of which is in arrear.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Haileybury:

1. For the purposes mentioned in the preamble the sum of Five Thousand Dollars shall be given to the Sisters of Providence by way of bonus, during the period of ten years from the 15th day of December, 1926, in equal annual instalments of Five Hundred Dollars each.

2. That the said yearly sums of Five Hundred Dollars shall be collected by special rate upon the Corporation at large, and shall be devoted to the said purpose and to no other.

3. This By-law shall take effect on the day of passing thereof subject to its being assented to by the electors and its being further assented to by the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board pursuant to the Statutes in such case made and provided.

Passed in open Council this day of April, 1926.

At the Municipal Building, Main Street for Polling Subdivisions Nos. 2 and 3.

At J. Farmer's House, Meridian Avenue, for Polling Subdivisions Nos. 5 and 6, and that the 14th day of April, A.D. 1926, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon at the Council Chambers, Ferguson Avenue, in the said Municipality has been fixed for the appointment of persons to attend at the polling places, and at the final summing up of votes by the Clerk.

And that if the assent of the electors is obtained to the said proposed By-law, it will be taken into consideration by the Municipal Council of the said Corporation at a meeting thereof to be held after the expiration of one month from the date of the first publication of this notice, and that such first publication was made on the Eighteenth day of March, A.D. 1926.

Take Notice further that a tenant who desires to vote upon said proposed By-law must deliver to the Clerk not later than the tenth day before the day appointed for taking the vote a declaration under the Canada Evidence Act, that he is a tenant whose lease extends for the time for which the debt or liability is to be created, or in which the money to be raised by the proposed By-law is payable, or for at least twenty-one years, and that he has by the lease covenanted to pay all municipal taxes in respect of the property of which he is tenant other than local improvement rates.
