
Using the theme of "Country fun, city handy," the soci-

Vehicle break-ins

A Weber Drive resident started the month of August on a down note, finding that his briefcase had been removed from his vehicle some time during the night. The vehicle contained a specialized tool kit used in the repair of computers.

The value of the tool kit and briefcase is estimated at about \$1,500. Halton Regional Police report no signs of forced entry on the vehicle.

That same evening a Gray Gate resident reported the theft of about \$100 worth of cassette tapes from an unlocked vehicle. Police report that the perpetrator was spotted and fled the scene when disturbed. There was no damage to the vehicle and police currently have no suspects in the crime.

B&E on Armstrong

Sometime between the close of business Friday and the early morning hours of Saturday, a break-in was detected at an Armstrong Avenue business. Police report that about \$400 worth of tools, wheels and other items were removed. An investigation is ongoing; police have several suspects in mind.

Vehicle damaged

On July 30, a Guelph Stteet man returned home to find his 1989 Toyota Land Cruiser had been scratched from end to end down through the paint. Police currently have no suspects in the crime. Damage is estimated at \$800.

Car, house vandalized

In the early morning hours of Aug. 5, two Raylawn Crescent homeowners awoke to find someone had spray painted their car and house with graffiti. The front windshield and hatchback of the 1992 VW Golf were covered with paint.

Parking signs removed

Halton Regional Police report that No Parking signs are being removed by persons unknown on Main Street. Over the last two weeks police have noted that several signs have been removed from postings on the walls of downtown buildings. Police are continuing to investigate.
