For the first time in 15 years the Rotary Club of Georgetown is hosting an exchange student and Tamira Snell couldn't be happier.

The 17-year-old high school student fron Hellerup, Denmark arrived last week to find that a barbecue had been planned in her honour, something which surprised and delighted her.

"I think this all started when I was about 12, I started dreaming about being an exchange student. Canada was my first choice, Australia was second and Mexico was my third choice.

During her time in Georgetown Tamira will be staying with four different families including that of Bob and Lorraine Kitchen, whose son Mike is currently on a one

year exchange is Queensland, Australia.

After a 15 year absence, members of the Georgetown Rotary are once again participating in the exchange program, designed to promote greater understanding of the differences between nations and cultures, as well as providing students with opportunities that can change their lives.

The decision to return to the international exchange program in the Georgetown chapter came about as a result of a number of events. Former Rotary president Sarah Cornett, who grew up in a Rotary family that hosted exchange students, expressed an interest in having the Georgetown club rejoin the pro-


"It really is a tremendous committment on the part of a club to do this," said John Hill, International Service Director for the Georgetown

young people and new communities. The program is open to children of members and non-members, who will be at least 15 years of ages, but not yet 18 as of Sept. 1.

Law office rezoning approved

Subject to site plan approval, the Town will allow rezoning for a law office and residence on the northwest corner of Main Street and Park Avenue.

The property at 134 Main Street was the former law office of now-Judge John Belleghem and the current owner, Fred Leitch, QC, applied for the zoning change to legalize the existing use.

Although the property is designated as "commercial-residential" the rezoning is required for the office component on the site, which is zoned as third density residential.

Two neighbours complained that the rezoning will cause traffic congestion in the residential neighbourhood but staff said the two parking spaces on-site and

the 15 available parking spaces in the area are adequate. One neighbour's concern that the site did not meet the Town's bylaw for "home occupation" use because no lawyer lives there as required, was dealt with by making the rezoning site-specific.

Use of a third floor loft for anything other than storage and possibly a library will not be allowed.
