In preparation for a trip to take place in little more than a year, about 25 members of the Holy Cross Church Youth Group are making plans to visit France next summer, touring the country, visiting churches and seeing the Pope at World Youth Day next August..

As a highlight to the twoweek trip, the youths are taking part in the World Youth Day celebrations, being granted an audience with Pope John Paul II as he addressed the crowd in Paris.

have been raising money for the trip in a variety of ways including organizing and hosting a yard sale and silent auction at the church last weekend. Many of the organizers pulled an all-nighter, trying to organize items for sale. By all accounts, the time and trouble was well worth it - organizers estimate that over 400 people showed up, spending about \$7,000 over the course of the day.

"The youths were very much supported by the Knights (of Columbus), the CWL (Catholic Women's League) and parishioners of all ages," said one parent. "We'd like to thank everybody for supporting it."

## Main Street 'visioning'

If you have an opinion or comment about the future of Georgetown's downtown core, then Ward 3 Councillor John Day wants to hear from you.

Day has put Town Council on notice that he intends to ask for a staff report that considers, among other things, the need for a master plan for the downtown, the identification of partners, a public consultation process and costs and timing.

"I want to get a sense of opinion and comment from owners of the commercial buildings, the retailers, the users, area residents and others," Day explained last Thursday.

"I want to know what they consider the most important improvement needed to revitalize the core because there is a need for some visioning there," Day said, explaining that there are many different views, or visions, about what could and should be done in the area.

Day said his public survey won't be another expensive consultant's study or another government project but will be a community project.

In his Notice of Motion, Day notes the Town's Official Plan recognizes the Georgetown Central Business District as a unique historic commercial area within the Georgetown community and tourist market, and the goal is to encourage development of the commercial and residential uses.

Day's survey, which he is paying for himself, asks people to list the top three items they feel would improve downtown Georgetown, how they would like to participate in a public consultation process and what other comments they have.

"Although there are various groups including the Chamber of Commerce and the BIA that have ideas of what should happen in thedowntown, there isn't a common denominator or a clear vision," Day said, noting that some would like to see all of the downtown parking meters removed.

Others would like to see a major retail chain locate in the downtown core and some think that there should be an overall visual urban design

Anyone interested in commenting on the downtown future should answer the questions posed by Day and drop off their comments at any downtown retailer, the BIA office at 191 Mill Street, the Civic Centre or mail it to Day at 70 River Drive, Georgetown, L7G 2J2, or call Day at 873-3979.
