main chopping block any more, but will make our pitch to the Board at the Nov. 19 meeting," Racinsky explained on Saturday.

At Monday's Town general committee meeting, Glen Williams school council vice-chair, Mimi Burdett, suggested that the Town should tell the board that it's not opposed to the disposal of Wrigglesworth or Speyside schools with the exception of the Wrigglesworth soccer fields.

The superintendent's council did not recommend selling the soccer fields at McKenzie-Smith Bennett Public School because there is no market for the 7.4 acre property, which has been deemed surplus by the Board.

No teaching positions will be lost by the moves but there will be some reductions in the number of principals, secretarial and custodial staff.

Trustees were briefed on the proposed accommodation report on Monday night and are expected to make final decisions on land sales and school closures in December. The week of November 18 to 21 has been set aside by the Board to hear public delegations and the Board will travel to Acton on Tuesday, Nov. 19 for a meeting at Acton High.

Partied too hearty

Halton Regional Police constables arrested a Georgetown man following a complaint of a disturbance at a Dayfoot Drive house party, Friday.

Police report that an 18-year-old male was arrested after police tried to disperse a large crowd of partygoers after neighbours complained about the noise. According to police, the man became combative when placed in the back seat of the police car, kicking out the car window.

He now faces charges of causing a disturbance, uttering threats and mischief. He is due to appear in court Nov. 25.

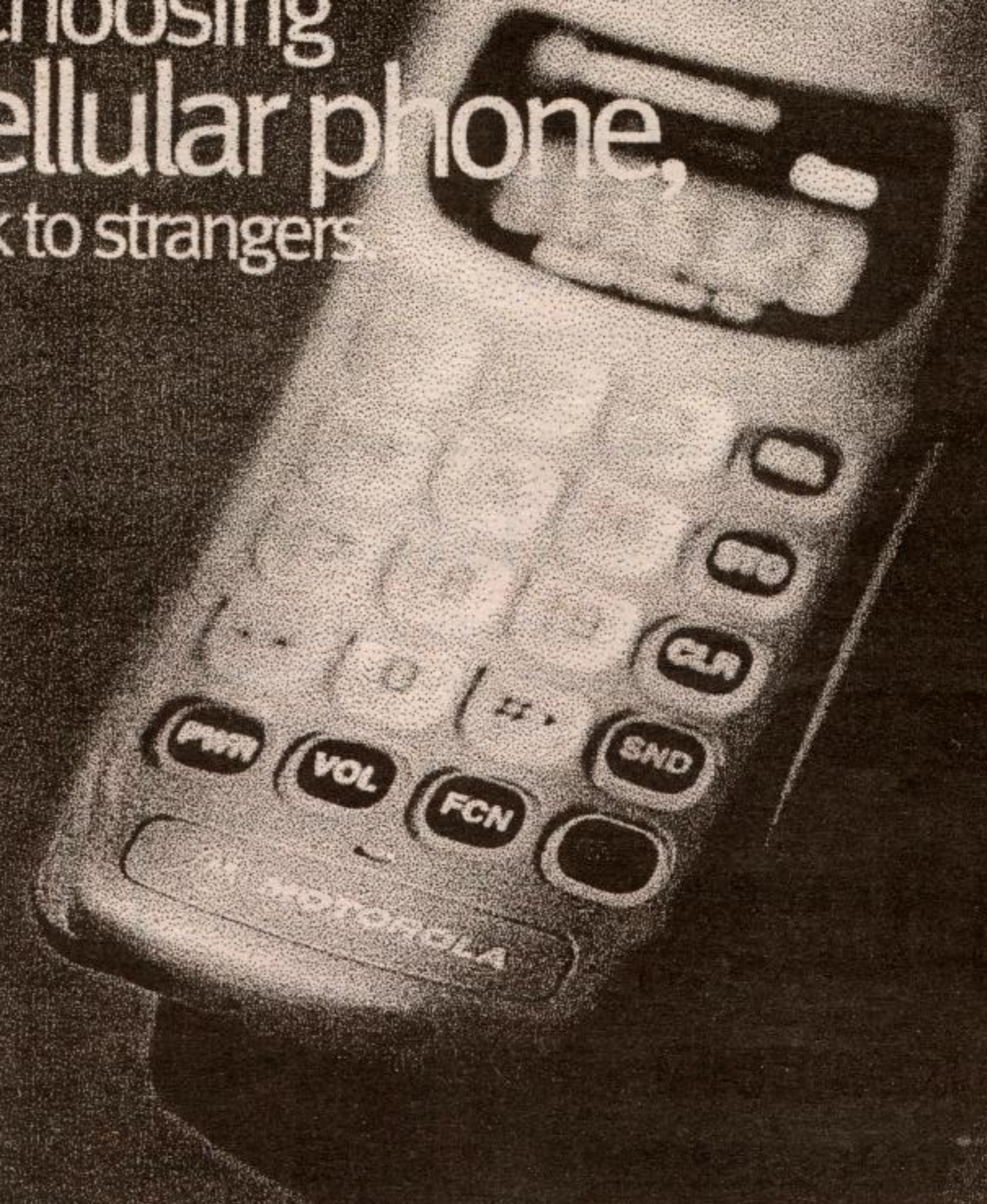
