Region updates Georgetown water allocation situation

It may be "use it or lose it" when it comes to water allocations for Georgetown developers who have draft approval and a water allocation for their proposal, but are not ready to build.

Following a water update by Halton Region staff on Monday night - a briefing that indicated the Town is overcommitted on draft approval by 10 per cent for the amount of water that is available - Hills Mayor Marilyn Serjeantson said that it's unfair that some developers who are ready to build but don't have a water allocation are on hold while other developers are sitting on un-used allocations.

"Use it or lose it - I'd support that," Serjeantson said after the meeting, suggesting that the Town might give draft approval to proposed developments without attaching a water allocation.

"If we had done that all along, maybe we wouldn't have people sitting with a water allocation and not using it and that would give us better use of what water we have."

During the briefing, which covered available water allocations, a update on well testing in Georgetown, and information on sewer system upgrades necessary for Georgetown development, councillors were told that Halton Region is reviewing a recent Ontario Municipal Board See WATER, Page 4
