Man arrested in armed Edith Street stand-off

Halton Regional Police arrested a 43-year-old Georgetown man after an armed stand-off on Edith Street last Tuesday night.

Members of the Tactical Rescue Unit (TRU) surrounded the residence north of Church Street, bringing an end to a scene which had begun more than six hours earlier.

According to police reports, the female landlord attended 11 Division in Georgetown to file a complaint against a male resident in the · home at approximately 5:15 pm. She alleged that he had fired a gun in close proximity to her while inside the house. Apparently the gun was fired as a result of an argument between the man and the woman regarding his employment. Both parties work with a program called "Bridge" which helps ex-convicts re-adapt to society after release from prison.

The sound of the gunshot

left the woman temporarily

After attempting to contact the male, police attended the scene and set up a perimeter. Police also confirmed the fact that the man was armed with an assault rifle. Constables on the scene summoned the Halton Regional Police Service TRU as well as a police negotiator.

The negotiator was eventually able to get in touch with the man and attempted to have him surrender to police. Police report that the man continually refused to
