
## Regional Councillor seeking PC nod

Community and Social Services regarding fundamental Provincial reform, Halton North MPP Ted Chudleigh said that he believes the changes will be better for Ontario.

"I believe that these changes will result in the continued elimination of waste, overlap and duplication so we can deliver better quality services at a lower cost to the taxpayer, reduce property taxes, be more competitive and create jobs," Chudleigh said.

The government announced that it will take \$5.4 billion for education off the property tax bill.

Education costs are rising and the government wants to bring them under control and restore excellence in the classroom.


In exchange, other services will be moved to the local level where they can be delivered more efficiently. The savings from welfare reforms will also be shared with local governments.

There have been 24 studies on reforming education since 1950.

Most agree that by taking education off property tax, efficiencies can be found across the system. Legitimate education needs will be fully funded wherever they are identified. The government will no longer provide funds for modern school board buildings, furniture, extravagant trustee salaries and golf courses owned by school

"We are acting in the interests of the taxpayers," Chudleigh said. "Over the last decade, enrollment in our schools has risen 16 per cent and inflation has risen 40 per cent, but school board spending has shot up by 82 per cent and standards have not kept pace. That is not acceptable," the MPP said.

In response to different levels of funding for students across the province, Chudleigh said, "We will meet the needs of students wherever they are - from Halton North to Dryden. All students will have the same opportunities."
